Incredibles 2

Despite feeling like an age has passed (it has, fourteen years to be exact) in the film world we pick up mere seconds later as the spotlight falls squarely on the supermum.

The Incredibles' blundering attempts to stop molelike villain Underminer have left a trail of chaos. The Parrs end up living in a sleazy motel. It looks as if they will have to get ordinary, civilian jobs to pay the rent. A marketing tycoon Winston Deavor (Bob Odenkirk) thinks the time is now to get the Incredibles back into the public's good graces and he believes Helen, aka Elastigirl (Holly Hunter) is the perfect poster child, so he launches a campaign to make superheroes popular again. Mr. Incredible, aka Dad is stuck playing Mr. Mom at home, totally unable to cope with Violet's boy problems, Dash's adolescent rebellion and baby Jack-Jack's rapidly increasing powers. Cue for the return of fashion guru Edna Mode to take the demon baby in hand for his very own super suit.

Incredibles 2 is a delight for all ages and may be the best superhero film since Big Hero 6. It is absolutely worth the wait. (*research Jack Whiting*) Find an excuse, or a child, but be here.

Ant-Man & The Wasp

If you were left wondering where this microscopic Avenger was during the bombastic Infinity War, then this fun prequel will bring you up to speed.

Just when Scott Lang (Paul Rudd) aka Ant-Man thought he was out, they pull him back in: scientist Hank Pym (Michael Douglas) and his daughter, Hope (Evangeline Lilly) who also wears a version of the suit, making her the Wasp. Who has to effect some transformational wonders to bring him to their laboratory while leaving behind the ankle monitor he wears as part of his house arrest.

They need him for a rescue mission: thirty years earlier, Hank and his wife, Janet (Michelle Pfeiffer) the previous Wasp, shrank to subatomic size for a battle, but Janet got stuck that size and hasn't been able to come back. Since Ant-Man, in the previous film, proved able to both enter the "quantum realm" and exit it safely, they need his help to bring Janet back.

This unassuming sequel is just the antidote to that last, very heavy Marvel entry. It may not leave a lasting impression, but who doesn't want to see a car sized Pez dispenser used as a projectile weapon? (Jack Whitina) Who doesn't indeed Jack?

Sicilian Ghost Story

Inspired by a horrifying true crime which shocked Sicily in the 90s, Sicilian Ghost Story merges gruesome reality with fantasy for a refreshing take on the Mafia film. When 12-year old Luna's (Julia Jedlikowska) crush mysteriously vanishes after their first kiss, she is bewildered when her town is indifferent to Giuseppe's (Gaetano Fernandez) disappearance. Aware that the young boy's father is ex-Mafia, the adults automatically turn a blind eye to the missing schoolboy. Luna fails to raise a search party for Giuseppe, shattering her childhood innocence. Fiercely determined to find him herself, the film acquires elements of a dark fairytale, as its young heroine's imagination leads her into an enchanted forest and mystical lake. The lines between reality and hallucination are then blurred, as Luna's quest has a dreamlike, even nightmarish, quality. With meticulous detail paid to her sensory experience, the naturalistic cinematography and eerie sound design create a highly immersive experience. Despite their age, Jedlikowska and Fernandez's debut performances are outstanding as they navigate heavy subject material with an easy sophistication. Deserving of the standing ovation it received at Cannes, the film promises to leave you stunned. (research Rachel Williams) Stunned and unable to stand, mesmerised and breathless. A rare surreal journey. Come.

Swimming With Men

Rob Brydon sculls, rolls and dives in Oliver Parkers splashy comedy-drama.

Brydon plays Eric Scott, a man suffering from midlife crisis. Following a penny-drop moment from the bottom of his local baths, he decides to reinvigorate his life by diving into the world of male synchronised swimming ('formation drowning' in Terry Wogan's parlance) believing he can win back the affections of his wife Heather (Jane Horrocks). So upon joining his local team, Eric finds an unlikely brotherhood in his fellow swimmers as they train for the world championships in Milan.

It's not tremendous fun? But with a cast of unlikelies like: tough-faced Daniel Mays, dignified Jim Carter, lucky Thomas Turgoose, unlucky Rupert Graves and the remarkable Charlotte Riley, it makes for a plucky, diverse bunch who inevitably hold each other together, above and under water.

As Mays' Colin sums up: "We're just a bunch of middle-aged men who meet up in trunks too small, to make funny patterns in a pool.' (research Chris Coetsee). These actors do it all, no stand-ins. Not the fittest specimens to start nor by the end, but watch them, get it right making the best of a thin script and the most of underwater.

Mission: Impossible - Fallout

By now they should just rename it 'Ridiculous Stunts in the Sky and other Fabulous Locations', because this is essentially what the spy franchise has become. And all the better for it.

The stakes have been well and truly raised as the events from 2015's Rogue Nation spill over into this, creatings double crosses galore. Ethan Hunt (Tom Cruise) is joined by his dedicated IMF team (Simon Pegg et al) as usual, but bringing back Rebecca Ferguson was the film's smartest move. Henry Cavill and his giant arms are also brought into the fold as a shifty CIA agent.

22 years and 6 films in and Cruise hasn't shown signs of fatigue. Doubling down on Hunt's insanity since Ghost Protocol, the M:I series has traded in narrative cohesion for sheer thrills. And what thrills! As if running down the world's tallest building, hanging off the side of an A440, or driving at full speed against oncoming traffic on a superbike (in a shirt no less) wasn't enough to establish Cruise's total - and completely mental - dedication? Fallout comes along and sticks him a helicopter, upside down over mountains in Norway. Your move 007. (Jack Whiting)

The Happy Prince

A sensational Rupert Everett writes, stars and directs this flamboyant biopic, detailing the ignominious final years of Oscar Wilde.

Named after Wilde's short story written for his children, which he unfolds over the film, he battles to emerge from the darkness of his disgrace. Offering a surprising and courageously unflattering portrait of Wilde's post-prison existence in France and Italy, The Happy Prince puts its subject under intense scrutiny. His treatment is unforgivable but he's undone by his own weakness, striking up a friendship with two urchins he extracts sexual favours from the elder, while playing fatherly storyteller to the younger. And, although prone to resilient demonstrations of strength, he is nevertheless mired in self-pity, venting his anger on those who love him most.

The tone throughout is sympathetic and Everett captures all the sadness of a fallen genius, chiefly the despicable way Wilde is treated by the public and criminal justice system. It is his show really, igniting the spark behind Wilde's sorrow to light the way for the story to progress. (research Chris Coetsee). Everett was born to play/be Wilde, and a huge, out of the attic, portrait he paints. Don't miss.

The Guardians

Xavier Beauvois's graceful, commanding First World War drama explores the toil and turmoil of those left behind.

Nathalie Baye plays Hortense; a strong, controlling rural matriarch, hardened by a life of challenges and setbacks. With her two sons Constant and Georges and her son-in-law Clovis away at the front, she runs a small family farm with the assistance of daughter Solange (Laura Smet). When the demand becomes to much, Hortense hires Francine (Iris Bry), a young, local woman orphaned from birth. Desperate to be accepted as part of a family, she labours tirelessly; her diligence and effectiveness working in the fields surprising and surpassing all. When Georges returns on leave, the pair are immediately smitten and against a backdrop ravaged by war, they make each other blossom.

Beauvois, perhaps best known for the acclaimed Of Gods and Men, channels a seismic sensitivity to the ordeals faced by enclosed communities in wartime. Championing the quiet heroism of the hard labour endured by those at home, he masterfully captures both the emotional intensity of conflict and the way in which it forever changes those it touches. (*research Chris Coetsee*) Wow! Don't think twice just come.

Book Club

There are plenty of raunchy old men films, sclerotic efforts like Last Vegas or The Bucket List. It's only fair that women of a certain age should be seen behaving badly too (aren't they the only kind worth knowing). Uh oh.

Diane (Keaton), Vivian (Fonda), Sharon (Candice Bergen) and Carol (Mary Steenburgen) are lifelong friends who have discussed books and quaffed wine every month since the late 1960s. Then one of them suggests Fifty Shades of Grey and the women collectively get their mojos back.

But as it turns out, Book Club is only tangentially about Fifty Shades, and that's what makes it quite smart. It uses E.L. James's notoriously silly BDSM saga as shorthand for a kind of romantic adventurousness, but the four leads all quickly pick up the beat and explore that idea on their own. They never get around to picking up any chains or whips, but at least one of them sets up a dating app. The final product to come out of the deranged premise is a warm, often funny, film that has a lot in common with Something's Gotta Give and is infinitely more relaxing than an evening in the red room...? (research Jack Whiting)

Some may baulk at yet another male dominated franchise being handed over without a fight to a female ensemble. Yet Oceans 8 shows that girls can have just as much fun, if not more, with wafer thin material.

What else does the film prove? That Sandra Bullock is just as fit to front an Ocean's film as George Clooney, if not, rather more so. That Anne Hathaway's comic skills and self-parody are well worth showcasing in bitchy roles. That Cate Blanchett absolutely rocks in cheetah-print coats and biker leathers.

Bullock stars as Debbie Ocean, the cheerily amoral sister of Clooney's Danny. Thieving runs in the family it seems. She has been languishing behind bars, and the moment she is out, the high heels go straight back on as she begins to put together the crew for her biggest robbery yet: to pinch a \$150m necklace at the Met Gala in New York.

Ignore the naysayers; Ocean's 8 is slick summer escapism. Who wouldn't want to enjoy the company of these eight women who make a zirconium plot sparkle like diamonds. (*Jack Whiting*). Nominated for 8 Oscars, Redford and Hoffman play Washington Post journalists Woodward and Bernstein (an exceptionally clever piece of casting, almost as true to the legend itself).

Opening with a bang (don't be late). It is 1972. A late duty policeman arrests five burglars at Watergate, the then Democrat party HQ. Believing it to be a minor news item the Post sends new boy Woodward (Redford) to cover the story. But when he discovers the intruders were no ordinary chancers, the thrill ride begins.

The cool thoughtful, Woodward (Redford) is assigned the hasty ankle biting over ambitious, Bernstein (Hoffman) to assist. Not a great idea? Watch as reluctance settles in to an arms-length trust. "A remarkably intelligent working, both as an effective thriller, and as a virtually abstract charting of the dark corridors of corruption and power." (Time Out) An edge-of-seat thriller of words, notebooks, clacking typewriters and desk telephones (landlines to you) Redford and Hoffman's 'Woodstein' is a subtle double act on every level. Pakula's direction is a masterpiece of slow-to-build wordplay and beautifully complex tension. It remains way ahead of its time by 23 years. Not here again (but still ahead) for 22 more. So don't miss it here and now.

The Meg

Jason vs Jaws? Stathe vs Shark? The Meg does exactly what it says on the tin; it's meat and potatoes, B-movie schlock; one that came with a \$150 million price tag, that's all.

The Meg sees a team of scientists based in the Mariana Trench attempting to uncover the mysteries of the deep. In doing so, they accidentally unleash a 75-foot prehistoric behemoth (a Megalodon). The only man capable of stopping said shark is Jonas Taylor (Jason Statham) a gruff rescue diver exiled to Thailand following a botched mission. "I don't dive anymore," he grimaces when the team try and recruit him. But it doesn't take much to change his mind. This mega shark then unleashes a series of attacks off the coast of China - because that's a lucrative market for box office profit nowadays - and it's up to the Stathe and his harpoon to save the day. Due to a strict 12A cert, we're denied chomped limbs and oceans of blood (at least kids won't be traumatised) so his shark tale has a distinct lack of bite. What it does have is buckets of silliness well worth a dive. (Jack Whiting) Bring your own spade.

Sgt. Stubby: An Unlikely Hero

A famous dog during WWI named Stubby might sound ripe for documenting via the medium of cinema, but this gentle animation is a delight.

The story – based on actual events – starts in 1917 and follows the amiable, squash-faced mutt, whom we meet living rough in Connecticut. He attaches himself to young recruit Conroy (Logan Lerman), after seeing him marching with his unit in the streets. When Conroy can't seem to shake the persistent pooch, he names him – you guessed it – Stubby and trains the dog to "salute" with his paw on command, winning over the commanding officers and earning Stubby the role of camp mascot. When Conroy gets shipped overseas to fight in France, Stubby smuggles himself aboard and ends up in the trenches, where he displays remarkable bravery and saves many lives.

Given its pedigree, Sgt Stubby takes fewer liberties than some fact-based war movies. It may not be Isle of Dogs, but this tale of canine courage is just appealing enough that anyone with a soft spot for a stray will not hesitate to enlist. (Jack Whiting)

Next up in a recent wave of Winnie the Pooh films is Christopher Robin: a nostalgic adventure which explores the importance of reconnecting with childhood when adult life weighs you down.

Christopher (Ewan McGregor) has grown up considerably after leaving the Hundred Acre Wood, all youthful innocence lost in the face of a mid-life crisis. A married father in 1950s Britain, work comes before family as he refuses to join his wife Evelyn (Hayley Atwell) and daughter Madeline (Bronte Carmichael) on a trip to his childhood home in Sussex (fool). Thankfully Britain's best loved bear returns to revive Christopher from his slump, naturally voiced once again by Jim Cummings. When Pooh is unable to find Tigger, Eeyore, Piglet and co, he steps through Christopher's door and ends up in London. Although Christopher is unenthused by the idea. Pooh convinces him to travel to the Hundred Acre Wood to help find his friends. The storytelling falters with its mixture of tones, yet A.A. Milne's characters remain as charming as ever, warming Christopher's heart which has grown weary over time. Sweet like honey, Christopher Robin does its best to capture the sentimentality of the original. (research Rachel Williams) Come as a child, perhaps bring some.

Spitfire

Charles Dance narrates this beautiful bombastic tribute to the RAF's most iconic fighter plane.

In the RAF's centenary year, directors David Fairhead and Ant Palmer take a nose-dive into what made this aircraft important on a world-affecting scale and personally through the words and faces of those who actually flew them during WWII. Spitfire is laced with gravitas, emotion and welcome good humour, immersing us in memories of that tumultuous time where this finely tuned machine gave a measure of certainty at a time when there was none.

Alongside a wealth of archive footage and Dance's huge tones, many of the best moments here feature the women who also piloted the Spitfires, helped build them, wrote their names under their wings and were as enraptured by them as any of the chaps. (Let's hear it for the 'WAFs'!)

The surviving Spitfire pilots are now in their 90s, The Few are becoming ever fewer, of which there were fewer who knew what they were doing, the rest had only just turned 16 with even less hours non-combatant flying time before they were thrown into the sky against a crack Luftwaffe.

Leaning Into The Wind: Andy Goldsworthy

Thomas Riedelsheimer's meditative documentary gets to grips with British sculptor and nature artist Andy Goldsworthy. His enduring outdoor landscapes stands huge alongside his ephemeral blink-and-miss-it 'indivisual performances'. He and they are the subject of a mesmerising film about art and time.

Following Goldsworthy around the globe, Leaning into the Wind paints a portrait of an artist who is less interested in leaving his mark than embracing the mark it leaves on him. Good work, he says, "Shouldn't be a mystery but a moment of clarity amid the chaos of life." Summed up in the moment that gives the film its title: a 'performative' piece in which he takes to a rain-lashed British countryside and repeatedly pushes his own balance against fierce headwinds.

Whether he's spitting a shower of flower petals, making a living sculpture from a fallen tree, or lying on Edinburgh pavements in the wet to create one of his rain silhouettes, the film lets us see not just the finished work and he behind it, but the way the art both alters and is altered by the surrounding landscape. (research Chris Coetsee) He's tougher than tough, a builder, a physicist, an architect, a leaver alone. An extraordinary, gentle fearless man. Come.

To Kill A Mockingbird

The Escape

Stifled by monotonous school pickups and supermarket trips, Gemma Arterton's powerful performance as a mother in existential crisis tackling a need to escape. Tara (Arterton) is a stayat-home mother of two children, whose identity is so bound to her role that we don't even learn her name until halfway in. Disconnected from her husband Mark (Dominic Cooper) and their suburban life in a Kent cul-de-sac, Tara struggles to find meaning in her mundane routine. Revealing her despair to Mark in a loaded whisper, "I'm not happy", she finds her pain misunderstood. Even her own mother (Frances Barber) dismisses her plight, arguing that Tara's "got it made - two cars and a conservatory!" Yet outward appearances cannot smooth over cracks under the surface. Although the film acknowledges mental health it never touches on it directly, which might be precisely the point it's making. Tara's inner turmoil is swept under the rug by her loved ones, failing to open up any compassionate discussion. When she buys a one-way ticket to Paris, it's unclear when or if she'll return. The Escape is a raw thought-provoking exploration into taboo aspects of womanhood. (research Rachel Williams). Holding something unspoken, not easily expressed, is a lonely place. One-way ticket, anyone...?



Hearts Beat Loud

Music serves as the connecting tissue in Brett Haley's charming indie drama.

Frank Fisher (Nick Offerman) is burnt out after 17 years running his Brooklyn vintage record store. His daughter Sam (Kiersey Clemons) is off to California to study medicine in a few scant weeks and the writing appears on the wall; perhaps it's time for a change. But old habits die-hard and after breaking out the music for one last family jam with Sam, Frank's audiophile ears perk up after they turn impromptu playing into something that quickly becomes a catchy hook. Having uploaded the song to Spotify, Frank is amazed when it takes off. Enter landlady Leslie (Toni Collette) to offer him an alternative solution that might just save the shop. A refreshing take on the coming-of-age story, Hearts Beat Loud has been an audience favourite at festivals this year, along with its toe-tapping finale. At its core this is the story of a father and daughter reconnecting over a shared love of music. The genuine warmth this film creates is one that you'll want to keep coming back to. (research Chris Coetsee) Refreshing indeed, a most welcome change to the glut of turgid coming-of-age yarns this year. Come, let your heartbeat sing...

The Big Bad Fox And Other Tales

After delighting audiences and critics alike at the 2017 London Film Festival, Benjamin Renner and Patrick Imbert's brilliantly observed French animation comes to The Rex.

It begins in a theatre, with a group of animals panicking before their impending performance of three stories. They needn't have worried, because the telling of each is very well done. In 'A Baby To Deliver', a pig, a rabbit and a duck make a terrible hash of uniting a baby with its intended parents, after a stork decides he can't be bothered dropping it off. 'The Big Bad Fox' sees a fox stealing three chicks with the intention of eating them, but finding himself overcome by parental instincts. The unseasonal 'Saving Christmas' has the trio from the first story on another absurd quest, this time to fill in for Father Christmas, who they think they've killed in a decorating mishap.

Much like the Ernest and Celestine, on which Imbert and Renner worked on previously, the artstyle has a loose, hand-drawn quality, with hasty brushworkstyle lines and watercolour splashes filling the spaces. It makes for sumptuous viewing. (Jack Whiting)

The Heiresses

The Children Act

Oscar winner Emma Thompson shares the screen with talented 'Dunkirk' newcomer Fionn Whitehead in this moving and moral legal drama.

Fiona Maye, a high court London judge dealing exclusively with family cases, is drowning in the midst of her own crisis. Having paid the heavy personal price for her overbearing workload, Fiona is at breaking point and when she finds herself ruling on the case of Adam (Whitehead) a brilliant 17 year-old boy who is refusing the blood transfusion that will save his life, she is led to question her own choices and forced to deal with regrets about her past decisions. Grounded in and around London's Royal Courts of Justice, this is a film which focuses on strength of script and acting, as opposed to dazzling visual statements. BlacKkKlansman

Visionary filmmaker Spike Lee does battle with this formidable, and incredibly, a true tale of race relations and bigotry across the US Mid-West.

In 1972, Ron Stallworth (John David Washington) was the first black detective in the Colorado Springs police department. Faced with (routine) discrimination and casual mistreatment from his peers, he is called upon to go undercover at a civil rights rally. Instead he somehow uses his position to investigate and expose the local chapter of the Ku Klux Klan. Remotely and cautiously building a relationship with KKK 'Grand Wizard' David Duke through telephone conversations, Ron then recruits his Jewish partner Flip (Adam Driver) to impersonate him, meet and infiltrate the Klan in the (white) flesh. As the pair find themselves in an escalating grapple to counter the group's shady activities, they must also challenge the indifference of their commanding officers and the surrounding community.

Blackkklansman walked away with the Grand Jury Prize at Cannes this year and will no doubt stand as a front runner when Oscar nominations roll around. Cold War


On heat...
