Whiplash

You really know heavyweight drama season is here when even the smallest of independents comes out of nowhere and completely floors you. Andrew (Miles Teller) is a talented, dedicated 19-year-old drummer at the fictional Schaffer Conservatory of Music in New York City. He's cherry-picked for a place in the school's studio jazz band by Terence Fletcher (an astonishing JK Simmons) a conductor who wanders the halls at night, his footsteps a metronomic clack-clack-clack, listening out for prospective young Gene Krupers he can hammer into brilliance.

"Trying to make a thriller about jazz is like trying to make a horror movie about All Bran (then again...) You are starting with a subject that inspires, in fans, the exact opposite of what feels like an emotion to the rest of us. Damien Chazelle has done just that." (*Empire*)

Writer director, the young Chazelle, responsible for last year's wonderfully bonkers Grand Piano, infuses his own experiences as a jazz drummer. (uh oh) Whiplash fizzes with energy. Simmons nabbed the BAFTA for best supporting actor, JK takes on the roll of Fletcher with such scary power, it won him a 2015 Oscar. Well deserved too. Spot him in 100 films, great as sarcastic cops/baddies/dads.

Blade Runner: The Final Cut

We're inching closer to 2019, when Blade Runner is set, and yet flying cars and slave androids are still the stuff of electric dreams. Harrison Ford is Rick Deckard, a bounty hunter tasked with eliminating a group of replicants (fancy name for androids) who have escaped from servitude and are now residing somewhere in a rain drenched, neo-noir Los Angeles. These replicants, led by a sympathetic Rutger Hauer, have developed their own consciousness, some even believing they are human. It's a theme that has been explored in many sci-fi stories but Blade Runner delivers it with a mature subtlety. Ridley Scott's seminal sci-fi opus was unfairly ignored upon initial release in 1982 but eventually found its feet on home video. It has since filtered through many editions and re-releases until this, the 'final' and finest cut, which Scott himself edited together; removing many unnecessary components such as the narration, and replacing the original's happy ending with an existential one. It is a film rich with texture and atmosphere; Scott's attention to detail and Vangelis' moody score lift Philip K. Dick's novel to new heights. Oh, and it still looks impossibly gorgeous. So, unsurprisingly, we now have The SECOND Best Exotic Marigold Hotel which sees Sonny (Dev Patel) finding business tough in preparation of his imminent marriage to the love of his life, Sunaina (Tina Desai). He has his eye on an old closed down hotel now that his first has only a single remaining vacancy, posing a predicament for fresh arrivals Guy (Richard Gere) and Lavinia (Tamsin Greig). Evelyn and Douglas (Judi Dench and Bill Nighy) have now joined the Jaipur workforce, while Norman and Carol (Ronald Pickup and Diana Hardcastle) are negotiating the tricky waters of an exclusive relationship, while Madge (Celia Imrie) juggles two eligible and wealthy suitors. Perhaps the only one knowing all the answers is newly installed co-manager of the hotel, Muriel (Maggie Smith) the keeper of everyone's secrets. As the demands of a traditional Indian wedding threaten to engulf them all, an unexpected way forward presents itself. Delicious stuff, pure unbridled entertainment. Cinderella

Disney appears to be on a roll with live-action updates of their beloved classics and this sugary adaptation is no exception. Dumbo and Pinocchio are up next.

Lily James (of Downton Abbey) is Cinders, finding herself in a Freudian nightmare when her mother dies and she gets a hateful stepmother and two awful stepsisters Drisella and Anastasia. A fairy godmother steps in (a dotty typecast Helena Bonham Carter looking delicious) and after the ball there's the glass slipper with all its brutally explicit conjugal symbolism. Richard Madden (of Game of Thrones) plays the prince: his court attire seems to include very tight and revealing trousers.

(Directions to the Ball no doubt?) It doesn't do anything particularly interesting with its material, but Kenneth Branagh applies a deft touch as director, refraining from the overuse of digital effects where possible. Unlike Alice in Wonderland, Maleficent, and Oz the Great and Powerful, Cinderella doesn't try to subvert the tone of these stories by going darker, or dipping its toes in Tolkien's pool, instead it aims the other way, being almost too faithful, too pristine – completely innocent and without irony – but still sumptuous all the same. (research Jack Whiting) Don't listen and don't miss



A Little Chaos

French landscape gardening history is reinvented in Alan Rickman's period romance, played out in Louis XIV's Palace of Versailles.

Set in 1682, A Little Chaos re-imagines the creation of the Rockwork Grove, a unique element of the breathtaking gardens at the Palace of Versailles, where King Louis XIV's celebrated landscape designer, Andre Le Notre (Matthias Schoenaerts) is tasked with overseeing the creation of an outdoor ballroom as part of the Sun King's grand expansion plans.

Le Notre turns to talented outsider, Sabine De Barra (Kate Winslet) to bring a fresh perspective to the project and is initially unsettled by her free-thinking style, but slowly starts to appreciate the value of a little chaos in her methods. However, Sabine struggles with class barriers as she and Andre become romantically involved and her fight against patriarchy and sabotage tests her determination to its limits.

While We're Young

Noah Baumbach's While We're Young is a comedy of middle youth: the story of one man's midlife crisis, made more exquisitely horrible by his making a fool of himself, not with a younger woman, but a younger man. It is not a sexual relationship, but something more painfully intimate: a matter of self-esteem and social status. Ben Stiller and Naomi Watts star as Josh and Cornelia, a childless New York married couple in their mid-forties. As their other friends all start having children, they gravitate toward a young hipster couple, Jamie (Adam Driver) and Darby (Amanda Sevfried). He's an aspiring documentary filmmaker, Josh is already a top doc-director. Soon the older couple begins enjoying the energy they feel hanging out with the younger generation, but eventually Josh begins to suspect his new best friend might not be as straightforward and trustworthy as he thought.

Force Majeure

A critical favourite and word-of-mouth sensation at last year's Cannes Festival, where it took the Jury Prize in Un Certain Regard, this wickedly funny and precisely observed psychodrama tells the story of a model Swedish family - handsome businessman Tomas, his willowy wife Ebba and their pre-teen children, on a skiing holiday in the French Alps.

The sun is shining and the slopes are spectacular but, during lunch at a mountainside restaurant, an avalanche turns everything upside down. With panicked diners fleeing in all directions, Ebba calls out for her husband as she tries to protect their children. Tomas, however, makes a decision that will shake the family's world to its core.

Everything Is Illuminated

This deliberately returns to The Rex, after three years absence. It tells a tale of hope set against **historic despair.** It is a surprising and beautifully judged tale about three unmatched characters thrown together on a journey. By the end they will have stolen each other's heart and yours. Taken from Jonathan Safran Foer best-seller, it reads on screen like a true story. 'Jonfen' (Elijah) journeys from America in search of the woman he believes saved his grandfather's life during the Nazi massacre of a lost Ukrainian village. With only a creased photograph he sets off with the unlikely Alex (Eugene Hutz), his grandfather (Boris Leskin) and his "seeing-eye" bitch, 'Sammy Davis Jr-junior'. Alex's perplexed Ukranian 'guide' and his butchery of spoken English set the tone for his beautifully judged narration. Much of the music is his too. That's his real band playing at the station! Liev Schreiber's direction is unhurried and priceless, another happy surprise (look him up). He clearly understands that the best films come when the story is let out and the actors are freed

It is haunting, uplifting, heartbreaking and funny, and one of the best and favourite independent films at the Rex across ten years. It will stay with you.

Good Kill

Director Andrew Niccol, writer of The Truman Show, emphasises the callousness behind the soulless face of modern US drone warfare. Ethan Hawke terrifically plays Major Tommy

Egan, a former Air Force pilot who now remotely eliminates targets in Afghanistan from a military compound near Las Vegas. As the missiles fly, his conscience rattles and the cracks begin to show as his marriage slowly unravels and he begins to find solace at the bottom of the bottle.

The psychological drama that develops surrounding Egan and his family lends an added richness to what is already a deeply thought-provoking piece of filmmaking. Highlighting the increased used of 'video-game' kill tactics, Good Kill brilliantly questions the ethics of war that enables the ability to play God from lofty perches. "A sophisticated, provocative and thoroughly modern war film that makes Clint Eastwood's recent American Sniper look slow to find its target." (Telegraph)

Woman In Gold

This is the remarkable true story of one woman's journey to reclaim her heritage and seek justice for what happened to her family. Sixty years after she fled Vienna during World War II, an elderly Jewish woman, Maria Altmann (Helen Mirren), starts her journey to retrieve family possessions seized by the Nazis, among them Klimt's famous painting 'Portrait of Adele Bloch-Bauer I'. Together with her inexperienced but plucky young lawyer Randy Schoenberg (Ryan Reynolds) she embarks upon a major battle which takes them all the way to the heart of the Austrian establishment and the U.S. Supreme Court, and forces her to confront difficult truths about the past.

The Spongebob Movie: Sponge Out of Water

After their first cinematic outing over a decade ago, SpongeBob SquarePants and the gang return for another aquatic odyssey.

The film is about a pirate (Antonio Banderas) who steals a magical book, which tells the story that unfolds on screen: Bikini Bottom is an undersea world where SpongeBob, an employee of the popular Krusty Krab fast-food joint, guards the secret recipe for its best burgers. A rival called Plankton, owner of the grisly restaurant the Chum Bucket, wants to steal the recipe, a scroll kept in a bottle, but it vanishes in some weird hole in the space-time continuum; a catastrophe seemingly triggered by the pirate's unauthorised reading of the magic book.

The Dark Horse

Written and directed by James Napier Robertson, The Dark Horse is an inspiring true story based on the life of a charismatic, little-known New Zealand hero, Genesis Potini, played by Cliff Curtis (Whale Rider). Once a heralded chess champion, Genesis has spent the last few years in and out of mental institutions, battling with severe bipolar disorder. After being released from the psychiatric ward for one more chance at life, he moves in with Ariki, his gangpatched and distant brother, and Ariki's soon-tobe-patched teenage son, Mana.

Needing a purpose and a reason to get out of the gang house, Genesis joins a rough-as-guts local chess club, with the wild idea of coaching the motley crew of kids to the national chess championship. On the way, Gen must face the responsibility that comes with being a leader, navigate conflict within the gang world and try to survive the potentially devastating strife that breaks out between him and his brother over his nephew's future.

"The script could have done without the odd bout of heavy-handed chess symbolism ("a king for a king") but it's a solidly entertaining drama with an intriguingly unconventional lead." (Guardian) Don't miss.

The Water Diviner

Russell Crowe's undeterred commitment to storytelling provides a steady pulse in his directorial debut.

Set four years after the Battle of Gallipoli, Australian farmer Joshua Connor (Crowe) travels to Turkey to seek out his three missing sons and return them to their homeland. Upon his arrival at an Istanbul hotel he meets the mysterious and ridiculously gorgeous manager Ayshe (Kurylenko) who finds it in herself to help him. As he desperately searches for the truth while struggling with his own inner demons, Connor must keep the faint glimmer of hope alive.

Beautifully shot by cinematographer Andrew Lesnie (The Lord of the Rings trilogy) each scene is a treat for the eyes, perfectly capturing a bloodied and bruised post-war landscape.

It would be easy to dismiss The Water Diviner as overly-melodramatic but look past the surface and there is a considerable amount of depth in what is a well-constructed and sturdy feature. (*research Chris Coetsee*) And the well-constructed and sturdy Russell Crowe, has made a good job of it.



Far From The Madding Crowd

While we wait for Thomas Vinterberg's imminent adaptation of Far from the Madding Crowd, here is the restored re-release of John Schlesinger's mighty 1967 version, superbly photographed by Nicholas Roeg.

Julie Christie plays Bathesheba Everdene, a country heiress who is loved by three men, all of different temperaments and representing contrasting ideas of masculinity. 

The Face Of An Angel

Michael Winterbottoms's latest feature follows a failed filmmaker (uh oh) and an American journalist as they investigate the murder of a British student.

Based upon the real-life murder of Meredith Kercher and the acquited Amanda Knox, only the names and locations have been changed in what becomes an intriguing but muddled account. Having travelled to Siena to begin his research for a film on the case, Thomas (Brühl) embroils himself in the darker details surrounding the mystery, tormenting himself in the process while Cara Delevingne's debut performance as an English barmaid is both striking and charming and adds a refreshing note to an otherwise hanging sense of Gothic dread throughout.

Littered with perplexing dream sequences, the story lacks a solid sense of clarity and while it's certainly not without point, the non-conclusive reality of actual events may feel hauntingly similar. There's an otherworldly sensation of déjà vu when watching Home. Probably because it is essentially a caffeinated, sherbet coated version of Lilo & Stitch.

Based on popular 2007 children's novel The True Meaning of Smekday, the story centres on Oh (voiced by Jim Parsons) a misfit alien whose friendly but pushy people, the Boov, led by the blustering Captain Smek (Steve Martin) plan to take over the Earth. (Lost already?)

Oh ends up on the run from his own kind and forms an unlikely friendship with young human Tip (Rihanna who, unsurprisingly, is on most of its soundtrack) who is trying to find the mother (Jennifer Lopez, also on the soundtrack) she lost touch with during the Boov invasion. (You are now) This peculiar oddity sees DreamWorks animation at their lowest creatively. When their last was the wonderful How to Train Your Dragon 2, this seems all the more puzzling. John Wick

Keanu Reeves, with his solemn facial expressions and quiet demeanour, is a man with a dark past, who's effortless skill at dispatching goons is brought back into the spotlight.

When his 1969 Mustang is pinched (the price you pay for driving a rare model around a dodgy area it seems) and his adorable puppy, given to him as a gift by his dying wife, is murdered by thugs working for the Russian mob, John Wick, as you can imagine, gets pretty fed up.

The set up is so simple it's almost insulting, yet the plot is merely the framework in which to hang such wondrously executed sequences. Thanks to director Chad Stahelski's past work as a stunt coordinator, there's no holding back in Wick's world; no camera cut-aways or fussy, quick editing; every punch, every gunshot, every exit wound is beautifully framed in a ballet of blood and bullets. John Wick does with guns what The Raid (and its mind-blogging sequel) did with fists; make it all look effortlessly cool. 

Fast and Furious 7

Cobain: Montage Of Heck

The biggest and brightest emerging star of the 1990s grunge scene is given the full biographical treatment in Brett Morgen's superb rockumentary.

Although strewn with weighty contributions from the likes of Courtney Love and Krist Novoselic, a real treat is the eclectic mix of the Cobain's journal entries, drawings, home movies, scrawled notes and never-before-heard audio.

Without doubt the masterstroke comes in the ingenious animated segments that bring Kurt's scribbles to life, marvellously accompanied by orchestral renditions of Nirvana's most recognisable hits.
