

Ad Astra

It's Apocalypse Now in space as Brad Pitt goes from cool stuntman to spaceman in James Gray's rich, contemplative science fiction opus. Prepare to go interstellar.

Gray's films are typically detached affairs (The Lost City of Z being a tough nut to crack, but well worth the patience) however with Ad Astra, Gray and Pitt concoct an emotional, and thoroughly engaging journey into the cosmos. Pitt is Roy McBride; he is immune to fear, or maybe jaded by the prospect of pain, and so the ideal candidate to venture to a NASA communications base on Mars, and coax his missing-believed-dead father, Clifford (Tommy Lee Jones) back from the rings of Neptune and a longterm research mission named The Lima Project. The visual ravishments are plentiful, and Gray draws new aesthetic life from the extremely well-worn iconography of space suits, satellites and stardappled vistas of the sublime infinite. Ad Astra is a lament on the things we will never grasp in our relatively meagre lifetime. It is also a fantastic voyage into the unknown, and one of the finest sci-fi films made for modern big screen cinema. (Jack Whiting) We meagre wretcheds can't even grasp our own Earth, so Space is safe..?

Dora & The Lost City Of Gold

Dora the Explorer is a teen in this live-action adventure, brought to life by the magnetic Isabela

Moner. Having grown up in the Peruvian rainforest with her archaeologist father (Michael Peña) and zoologist mother (Eva Longoria), Dora (Moner) is free spirited, extremely energetic, and up for any adventure. Aside from the one she must now embark on. Instead of bringing Dora along on a mission to uncover Parapata, the lost city of gold, her parents ship her off to school in LA (perhaps the scariest task yet). Despite only knowing her cousin Diego (Jeff Wahlberg) Dora's positive outlook in any situation is infectious, with her desire to learn and spontaneous singing (Moner manages to make it endearing). We don't get to see Dora adapt to high school for long. She and her fellow outcasts, Sammy (Madeleine Madden), Randy (Nicholas Coombe) and Diego are kidnapped by mercenaries. Thankfully, explorer Alejandro (Eugenio Derbez) helps them escape, and the group find themselves in a location reminiscent of Raiders of the Lost Ark. The real mission begins: find Dora's parents and uncover the lost city of gold. An unexpectedly entertaining family film. (Rachel Williams) It is fab. Bring the street.

Judy

Set in 1969, the year before her death, Renée Zellweger embodies Hollywood icon Judy Garland.

The film explores (with a little sugar) the lows of the star's career and personal life. Departing from the glamorous image we have of those Hollywood days, Garland here is broke and desperate for a come-back after her glory days have long gone. When theatrical impresario Bernard Delfont (Michael Gambon in peerless smarm) invites her to a fiveweek run of shows at a London nightclub (as the greaseball did 'for' Laurel & Hardy). She accepts, leaving her children behind with ex-husband (Rufus Sewell). Despite the love pouring in from her fans, Garland is struggling behind the scenes with a long history of the usual addictions. Through a series of flashbacks to her traumatic childhood, young Judy (Darci Shaw) connects the dots between what she suffered as a child star and her current dependencies. So fairly useless and in rags, she tests the patience of assistant Rosalyn Wilder (Jessie Buckley) and hooks new lover Mickey Deans (Finn Wittrock). "Zellweger offers an all-singing, all-dancing, all-collapsing performance of the star at her lowest ebb" (Variety). (research Rachel Williams) Strong ironic choice of come-back star: Renée Zellweger. Begging Oscars all round...?

Downton Abbey

Downton Abbey was made to show here. Emma and Julian Fellowes are firm friends of the Rex.

A few years after the acclaimed series' end, the period drama set in the famed fictional Yorkshire country estate makes its big screen debut. With creator Julian Fellowes back on board, it's 1927 and Downton is turned upside down when Lord Grantham (Hugh Bonneville) is informed that King George V (Simon Jones) and Queen Mary (Geraldine James) will be staying the night. At first excited by the news of royal company, giddiness turns to outrage once the downstairs staff hear that King and Queen will bring their own servants with them. The formidable Countess of Grantham (played wonderfully by Maggie Smith) is also dismayed to hear that the Queen has brought her lady-in-waiting and a Crawley cousin Lady Bagshaw, (introducing the A-lister's A-lister: Imelda Staunton), with whom she has a long standing feud.

The royal visit unleashes 'scandal, romance and intrigue, which could leave the future of Downton hanging in the balance'. (research Rachel Williams) Oh dear... You wont miss it so the there's no point in further encouragement.

Just come and have done with it.



Honeyland

Gorgeous documentary on the nature of all things beautiful from directors Ljubomir Stefanov and Tamara Kotevska.

The films focus is Hatidze Muratova, the last in a long line of Macedonian nomadic beekeepers, living isolated in the mountainous region deep within the Balkans. Tending to her hives with near monastic devotion, Hatidze makes a meagre living farming small batches of their honey to be sold in the marketplaces of nearby villages.

They spent three years filming, and their time and patience gives us a deep, affectionate appreciation for Hatidze and her bees. She is calm, protective and respecting of her charges, taking only half of the honey she harvests, leaving the rest for the bees themselves.

When a nomadic Turkish family move onto the plot of land near Hatidze we see a threat emerge to the delicate balance of her solitary existence. As family's patriarch, Hussein, begins to see an opportunity to take up beekeeping himself, his efforts threaten to encroach on her already tiny livelihood. It offers an intimate portrait of a life lived in harmony within a natural world. (*Research Chris Coetsee*) Honeyland took home sweet Grand Jury prizes at this year's Sundance FF, hope Hatidze got hers...? Come and see.

Hustlers

An era-defining film that Hollywood didn't know it needed; Hustlers is female empowerment writ large as J-Lo and co. strut their stuff. Adapted from a magazine article about a scam perpetrated by a group of dancers at a New York strip club, Lorene Scafaria's wildly entertaining comedy offers both a welcome twist in the crime thriller genre, and a "I can't believe this actually happened" true-story drama in one clever and subverting package.

"This whole country's a strip club." This is the grand philosophy of dancer Ramona (Lopez) you're either the ones throwing the money, or you're the ones catching it from the pole. The original article frames the women in a Robin Hood contest; drugging and robbing Wall Street one creep at a time to afford a better life for themselves and their families at a time of financial disarray. Here, it plays out with the slickness of a Steven Soderbergh thriller; this all sounds headier than Hustlers' marketing would have you believe, but rest assured this is a tremendously entertaining film, and one of the year's sleeper hits. (research Jack Whiting) We pushed to get this in the programme, so come sisters, you wont be sorry, but you will if you miss it. So don't.

Riding on a tidal wave of controversy comes this 'serious' comic-book film from Hangover director Todd Phillips marking another risky entry into the genre? Joaquin Phoenix impressively contorts his skeletal frame into the role of Arthur Fleck, a downon-his-luck clown for hire with dreams of being a stand-up comedian. He and his mother (Frances Conroy) live in squalor in a rundown apartment in Gotham City, obsessing over a late-night TV talkfest hosted by Murray Franklin (Robert De Niro, channeling The King of Comedy). The emaciated sad sack is bullied on the subway by Wall Street wolves who think this mama's boy - who can't control his laughter - is cruisin' for a bruisin'. A previously introduced handgun is put to use, and the subsequent massacre turns our man in makeup into a tabloid star popular enough to inspire a chorus of masked clowns to march in protest against the rich. Enter mayoral candidate Thomas Wayne. With his new-found empowerment, Arthur declares war against the society he feels shuns him. It's a brutal, sometimes hard to watch thriller that liberally pinches from Scorsese to become a twisted beast of its own. (research Jack Whiting) Don't trust the whole contrivance - overexcited, overhyped and overpleased with itself..



Toy Story 4

Skepticism is only natural when confronted with an unwanted entry to a series that concluded faultlessly with the last one (TS 3).

Fear not Woody and Buzz fans! Turns out Pixar knew what it was doing all along - Toy Story 4 was already in its trick-bag. Zaniest of them all, certainly the funniest. Forky is a plastic spork with mismatched googly eyes, pipe cleaners arms, and in existential crisis. Despite not being an official toy, young Bonnie 'Frankensteins' him together herself, so Forky steals her affection over the others. Woody does his best to persuade him that being a toy can be as rewarding as being a plastic disposable..!! In town together, Woody is distracted by an antique shop. Sneaking inside in search of his lost love - Bo Peep, he falls into the clutches of Gabby Gabby (Christina Hendricks) a damaged doll who has designs on his pull-string voice box. He escapes, but Forky doesn't, which means it's time for one of Toy Story's signature rescue-missions.

This 4 reaffirms that Pixar, at its best, is like no other animation studio around. (research Jack Whiting) You'll have seen it by now. Come again and enjoy it properly.

For Sama

For Sama is the latest and maybe the most shattering of a dozen or so documentaries that have come out of Syria's Civil War.

Former Aleppo city resident and self-taught video journalist Waad al-Kateab took up the camera in 2012 to document the protests of her fellow students against President Assad. Her ever-present camera watches, unflinchingly, as events unfold over the course of the following four years, and Aleppo becomes a place of nightmarish daily violence. She kept filming as the city fell under siege, turning from the carnage only to record her growing affection for a doctor, Hamza, and the birth of their first child, Sama. The fact that, as an infant, Sama remains completely unfazed by the cacophony of war, sleeping through the nightly onslaught and giggling as her parents run with her for cover, speaks volumes about how the very young can come to regard all 'first' life things as normal life. Sama derives from the Arabic for 'sky'. Here the name becomes synonymous with hope, a promise of better times to be protected at any cost. (research Jack Whiting) Heartstopping, heartlifting, heartbreaking. How would we get through it without complaining...?

The Peanut Butter Falcon

Summer is well and truly behind us, but The Peanut Butter Falcon breaks through the clouds and rain like a final ray of sunshine, a November heat wave that'll warm you through and through.

Zack Gottsagen plays Zak, a young man with no family who lives in an old-age home in North Carolina. Zak has Down's syndrome, and while the state has deemed that he needs constant care, there's no appropriate facility available to him. So he stays with some feisty seniors - including Bruce Dern - several of whom befriend him. Now pals, they help him plan an escape, and off Zak journeys into the Carolina backwaters.

On his adventure Zak meets Shia LaBeouf 's swamp rat who wants to one day be a wrestler (a surprisingly soft and tender performance). The two form an unlikely friendship; their palpable chemistry transcends ideas of both masculinity and disability to create a heart-warming connection.

It's the scenes of these two misfits traipsing through the less-trod parts of rural America that give The Peanut Butter Falcon its offbeat, Mark Twain-esque charm. (the title is Zak's future wrestling 'handle', by the way) (research Jack Whiting) But it's better than that Come and see

Mystify: Michael Hutchence

Richard Lowenstein's long-gestating documentary Mystify: Michael Hutchence has finally arrived after a decade in the works. In truth, the veteran indie auteur has been chipping away at the film even longer than that, since the early days of his career, having directed several music videos for INXS - the Australian rock band the renowned singersongwriter fronted. Much more importantly, the film makes a powerful case that, despite a troubled upbringing, Hutchence was not naturally selfdestructive. There's music, of course, but Mystify is mostly pieced together via home video and fly-onthe-wall footage. Its unseen interviewees and gauzy intimacy recalls 2015's Amy. Friends, family and his bandmates open up in a way that speaks of a deep trust in the filmmaker. But you'll forgive this one for failing to break its subject's spell. As the tragedy unfolds, there's a strange solace in seeing this captivating enigma somehow emerging intact. And while Mystify in many ways amplifies the tragedy of Hutchence's suicide, it also goes a long way toward explaining and humanising it. (Jack Whiting) Hutchence oozes raw irresistible sex appeal. Hence, best to die young, aging does sex appeal no favours. Come and be onzed on

Lesser men than Brian Helgeland and Curtis Hanson would have baulked at adapting LA Confidential. Like most of James Ellroy's work, his 1990 novel is far too dense and nasty for the screen. And yet here we are, two decades later, looking back at Hollywood's last great, true noir. A massacre takes place at a cafe and one of the dead is a young prostitute. Her employer specialises in girls surgically altered to resemble movie stars. Among the police swept into the investigation are our three protagonists: Ed Exley (Guy Pearce) a detached careerist; Wendell "Bud" White (Russell Crowe) a thuggish plainclothes officer; and Jack Vincennes (Kevin Spacey) a glitz-obsessed "Hollywood Cop" who consults for a TV police serial. Kim Basinger (here in the image of Veronica Lake) steps in and steals the film from under their self-absorbed noses. The dialogue of Hanson/Helgeland's script avoids a '90s Tarantino imitation, but doesn't fall into selfsatisfied, hardboiled seriousness either. Among the awards showered on it, it's probably most impressive to have garnered Ellroy's blessing. Shown for the first time at the Rex in original glorious 35mm, it's not one to miss. (research Jack Whiting) indeed it isn't. Impeccable filmmaking.

Abominable

Or How to Train Your Yeti; this mountainous endeavour sees one of the big furry guys on a trek to get home to the Himalayas.

Yi (voiced by Chloe Bennet) is living with her mother (Michelle Wong) and delightful grandma Nai Nai (Tsai Chin) – and still not over the death of her violinist dad, who had inspired Yi to play the violin. Now she is working many jobs to pay for some much yearned for travel. When an adorable baby yeti escapes from a research lab owned by the alpinist-turned-corporate-plutocrat Mr Burnish (Eddie Izzard) our heroes must journey from the streets of Shanghai, cross the Gobi desert to the cliffs and mountains where the yeti hopes to be reunited with his parents.

There are some obvious borrowings from ET - the yeti has the supernatural power to control the elements, which means that a lot of the ordinary narrative jeopardy is conveniently abolished. Coldplay's tearjerker Fix You is shamelessly deployed at a key scene. Hankies at the ready. (Jack Whiting) It looks gorgeous.

Gemini Man

It's Smith vs Smith as the superstar clashes with himself, quite literally, in this bonkers sci-fi thriller. Ang Lee's recent career trajectory has focused on testing the boundaries of technology - starting with Life of Pi's incredible digitised tiger here the limits of the currently trending 'de-ageing' technique have been pushed to the extreme. This isn't simply a case of smoothing over wrinkles (although in reality, Smith is blessed with perfect skin) his face has been digitally reconstructed to make him look like he's jumped straight off the set of Fresh Prince of Bel Air, complete with trademark hi-top haircut.

This twenty-something clone, dubbed 'Junior', has been sent to assassinate Henry Broden (old Smith) who's tired of the government life and wants to hang up his gun. Henry gets the sense that his former handlers, led by a shady Clive Owen with a wavering accent, aren't just trying to stiff him out of a pension. The set-pieces have a slickness reminiscent of Lee's Crouching Tiger, even if the narrative isn't anything new. Now if only they could develop the technology to fix Owen's accent.. (Jack Whiting)

The Third Man

Our first film at the newly restored Rex in December 2004 The Third Man remains a huge global favourite. This BFI restoration brings the long shadows back to life.

Although his screen time is famously scanty Orson Welles' Harry Lime haunts every scene. Everywhere but invisible, he's a smirking Cheshire cat of a villain, a superb case study in shameless charisma as poisonous contagion. It is suffused with irony yet ultimately serious-minded: without personal responsibility, it says, there is no hope for civilisation – however charming the smirk.' (assorted clever clogs crits)

"In Italy, for 30 years under the Borgias, they had warfare, murder and bloodshed, but they produced Michelangelo, Leonardo da Vinci, and the Renaissance. In Switzerland they have brotherly love. They had 500 years of democracy and peace, and what did that produce? - The cuckoo clock!" (the smirking Welles improv line..?) Worst of all, Cary Grant was down for the lacklutre Joseph Cotton role as the hero and worse still - Noel Coward was to be Harry Lime. Now what a fabulous character film that would have made. Non Fiction

Romance's brave new world is debated in a snapshot of this bohemian Parisian publishing world. Controversial author Léonard (Vincent Macaigne) delivers his latest book to his editor Alain. Léonard's lover is the actress Selena (Juliette Binoche) Alain's wife. She guesses her husband, Alain, will recognise the participants of the book's affair as thinly disguised non-fiction? (so far so French) Set against the backdrop of the cut throat 21stcentury world of publishing where Alain presides. Bait

Young director Mark Jenkin's mesmerising debut feature chronicles the struggles of coastal life in an ailing Cornish community.

Martin (Edward Rowe) is a fisherman without a boat. While he struggles to save enough money to buy one, his brother has already refurbished their father's vessel for tourist cruises. Their childhood home is owned by incomers who rent it to holidaymakers. Tensions build between family, locals and tourists. Infused with earthy emotion and brittle black humour, Bait is bracingly experimental as it explores the fabric of a tiny, isolated fishing village. It is urgent and unpredictable, resolutely offbeat, but bold, moving and darkly involving. The grainy black-and-white 16mm gives the film an authentic early film makers feel. It stretches, scratches, crackles and glitters, like a weathered buffeted dinghy hugging the dockside. The Laundromat

Whatever happened to Steven Soderberg's self-proclaimed 'retirement' from big screen filmmaking? We're not complaining. Flops, Logan Lucky and Unsane have headed up a welcome return nevertheless. Ramón Fonseca Mora (Antonio Banderas) and Jürgen Mossack (Gary Oldman) are partners in a Panama City-based law firm that specializes in all kinds of not-quite-legal tricks designed to launder the fortunes of the very rich. They represent the entitled and the greedy, buy what they need and do what they want, without a thought for the consequences. The consequences as ever are borne by ordinary people - Ellen Martin (Meryl Streep) is a grandmother whose attempts to do apparently straightforward things like settle an insurance claim and buy a new condo are ensnared in complicated schemes that defy simple comprehension. With each segment, a comic tone makes way for something more sober as Soderbergh reveals the bigger picture. Terminator: Dark Fate

He wasn't lying when he said he'd be back. Arnold Schwarzenegger's time travelling cyborg returns yet again to prevent another robot from killing a girl who is key to the future of the human race.

Continuing the trend of ignoring previous instalments other than the original; declaring and solidifying that notion of 'sequel' by bringing back the original cast; here it's Linda Hamilton's hard-asnails Sarah Connor.

Dani Ramos (Natalia Reyes) is living a simple life in Mexico City when a highly advanced and deadly new Terminator (Gabriel Luna) travels back through time to hunt and kill her. Shaun The Sheep: Farmageddon

A long time effective and loyal intelligence office, Katharine is troubled when she receives an email from the NSA instructing her team to essentially blackmail members of the United Nations. By The Grace Of God

French filmmaker Francois Ozon shifts gears yet again in this emphatic drama surrounding the scandal of more child abuse in the Catholic Church.

Married with five children, Alexandre (Poupaud) is outraged to find the priest who had abused him as a child is still celebrating mass and teaching catechism to boys. Frustrated by the Church's stonewalling, Alexandre decides to go to the police but finds there is no legal imperative due to the Statute of Limitations. When fellow victims Francois (Menochet) and Emmanuel (Arlaud) hear about the case, they join the cause and a pressure group is formed. As publicity begins to snowball around them, more and more grown up victims begin to come forward. Taking an almost documentary approach with earthy characters and situations, the film barely pauses to catch breath. Ozon lays bare the hypocrisy at the heart of the established Church, its failure to deal with the serious problem of abuse in its ranks and its refusal to evolve.

Emotionally wrenching in all the right ways, it is a timely, urgent and powerfully moving drama which, like its central characters, seeks to lift the burden of silence. (Research Chris Coetsee)

Blinded By The Light

Bend It Like Beckham director Gurinder Chadha's heartwarming coming-of-age fable pits the music of The Boss against a murky backdrop of

The Day Shall Come

Nine years after the cold courage and brilliance of his last big screen offering, Four Lions (2010) director Chris Morris delivers another pitch-black comedy about police overreach and unabated racial inequality in America.

Marchant Davis stars as Moses, a semi-delusional Miami resident hoping to form an army to take on the "Oppressive Regime". But only finds four others. While his wife Venus, is fed up not being able to pay the rent. With his two sidekicks (McPherson and Mays) he recruits local shopkeeper Reza and jihadist Malik for support, unaware both are actually FBI informants. With Moses' blind refusal to use guns/violence in his cause, the Feds need a new angle. Led by Anna Kendrick's all-too eager beaver and Denis O'Hare's dangerously desperate boss, the agency concocts an absurd scam to try and link Moses to a supply of rogue nuclear weapons. An early pioneer among Britain's anti-authority comedy titans, Morris still appears several steps ahead in his agility in tackling the ridiculous and the taboo. This take on the robustly explored subject of terrorism feels fresh and essential. A slapstick, hilarious yet disturbing, poignant tale of injustice. (Research Chris Coetsee) Another bite at making no difference, but come for the day.



The Addams Family

Before you all click your fingers in unison - this isn't the beloved creepy classic from the early **nineties.** Instead it's an admittedly peculiar-looking animated update. The film places the Addamses in the 21st century to comment on how witch hunts of old have transformed into paranoid online neighbourhood watch groups. Clever! After a brief prologue depicting the morose wedding of Gomez Addams (Oscar Isaac) Morticia (Charlize Theron) the film leaps ahead to the classic Addams Family status quo. Gomez and Morticia are happily ensconced in a ghoulish haunted house with their murderously deadpan daughter Wednesday (Chloë Grace Moretz) and son Pugsley (Finn Wolfhard). Pugsley's impending "Sabre Mazurka" is a sort of bar mitzvah-esque coming-of-age ceremony. It is set to bring the entire extended Addams family into town. Conflict arrives in the form of a home-renovation celebrity named Margaux Needler, she's also planning a celebration. She's purchased a nearby village and given the place a complete make-over. She's planning on revealing the changes on her show and making a fortune in house sales. It's all together kooky fun. (Jack Whiting) Come, you decide on the last November Saturday matinee, how much 'kooky fun' you can take...

Timothee Chalamet holds the kingdom in David Michod's epic take on Henry V.

Henry has been living precariously away from the palace ever since cutting all ties with his tyrannical father King Henry IV (Ben Mendelsohn). With only his trustee and friend Falstaff (Joel Edgerton) a brave soldier to the King, to look over him, Henry ('Prince Hal') has been on a destructive path which could cost him everything. When his brother Thomas and his father die within days of each other, Henry is forced to step up to his duties, soon finding himself navigating thorny political and social issues which will eventually lead him to a deadly battle against France and its wayward prince, The Dauphin.
