

Salmon Fishing In The Yemen

Sun 1 6.00, Tue 3 7.30



Back, not so much by demand, as command. Still, this harmless film is taken from Paul Torday's wildly successful novel, and directed by Lasse Hallström (What's Eating Gilbert Grape, Chocolat), Salmon Fishing in the Yemen is a charming romantic comedy. Britain's leading fisheries expert Alfred Jones (McGregor) is called upon by a young consultant Harriet Chetwode-Talbot (Blunt) to fulfil a wealthy Yemeni sheikh's dream of introducing salmon fishing to the Arab nation. Jones rejects the eccentric notion, however when the Prime Minister's press secretary Patricia Maxwell (Scott Thomas) gets wind of the concept, the potential lure of furthering UK/Arab relations, proves too great. Thus, Jones is pressured into spearheading the project. Can the three of them help fulfil the sheikh's absurd dream? Is it so absurd...?

Oscar-winning screenwriter Simon Beaufoy (Slumdog Millionaire) does a solid job of adapting Torday's charming book, and McGregor plays the socially awkward fisherman in his own voice, for a change.

"Hallström wheels out the 'swimming against the tide' visual metaphor once too often, and there's some drop-off in pace towards the end. But this isn't half as gooey as one might expect..." Born Allan Stewart Konigsberg in the Bronx in 1931, Woody Allen is one of the greatest living directors. The neurotic New Yorker is responsible for such fabulous films as Annie Hall, Manhattan, Hannah and Her Sisters, etc and now a Rex favourite, Midnight in Paris.
Directed by Robert B Weide, this hilarious, engrossing, documentary chronicles

engrossing, documentary chronicles Woody's humble beginnings as a comedy writer, stand up comic in Greenwich Village, and finally, the director we all know, equally loved and not so. A tediously long queue of talking heads from all eras of Woody's life pop up to share anecdotes about him: Diane Keaton, Larry David, Scarlett Johansson, Martin Scorsese, and the rest. Perhaps more interestingly, Allen himself features prominently in the picture, walking through New York regaling anecdotes from his childhood, and showing off his halfcentury old typewriter in his modest apartment.

Written and directed by Wes Anderson. Moonrise Kingdom is a quirky, retro, quasi-coming-of-age tale.

1965, New England. At a Khaki Scout summer camp, an exceptionally skilled scout, and eccentric loner, Sam (Jarden Gilman) goes missing. He has run away with local girl Suzy (Kara Hayward). The two having fallen in love; much to the chagrin of her parents Walt and Laura (Bill Murray, Frances McDormand). As various authorities; scout master Ward (Edward Norton), police captain Sharp (Bruce Willis) and social services (Tilda Swinton) join the hunt for the missing children, a violent hurricane begins to form off the coast of their small New England island...

Wes Anderson's heavily stylised, immaculately conceived direction makes Moonrise Kingdom an exceptional film. A glorious soundtrack, predominantly by Andre Desplat, but which also makes excellent use of Benjamin Britten's Young Person's Guide To The Orchestra, works wonderfully as we recall, with Sam and Suzy, the excitement and adventure of first love. It's fun, fey and utterly charming. "Anderson's homemade aesthetic is placed at the service of a counter-digital, almost hand-drawn cinema, and he has an extraordinary ability to conjure a distinctive universe, entire of itself. To some, Moonrise Kingdom may be nothing more than a souffle of strangeness, but it rises superbly." (Guardian) (Simon Messenger)

Men In Black 3

It's been a whole decade since the ET busting secret agents hung up their space guns and now here we are with a third chapter no one really wanted. The good news? It's a galactic step up from the lightweight sequel.

Beardy alien fugitive Boris the Animal (Flight of the Conchords' Jermaine Clement) has a bone to pick with ageing Agent K (T Lee Jones) for past grievances that have left him bitter. Boris succeeds in erasing K from existence via time travel means, leaving partner Agent J (Smith) jumping back to 1969 to warn a younger K (Brolin) from the future threat, and of course, save the world.

The perfect casting of Brolin as K's younger self is MiB3's ace in the hole – mimicking Jones right down to the southern drawl, squint and deadpan delivery. Their chemistry gives a much needed jolt to genre trial & error such as this, and it pays off in spades.

Marley **Sat 7** 7.00



Back on a Saturday by overwhelming demand, it traces Marley's life and career from his childhood as a fatherless mixed-race farmboy in rural Jamaica, through his wild adolescence on the mean streets of Kingston's Trenchtown slum, all the way to his tragically early death at 36.

Marley doesn't stray from the familiar rags-to-riches music documentary format, mixing interviews, archive material, concert broadcasts and new footage of key locations in the story - and some fabulous faces early on chuckling through their own patoir commentary.

We hear how he inspired many as a Rastafarian prophet, yet his peace'n'love image is complicated by accounts of his "competitive" streak and domestic shortcomings, the latter expressed by cheated-on wife Rita and painfully neglected daughter Cedella.

"While Kevin Macdonald (Touching the Void) has nothing but praise for Marley as a musician and political figurehead, he is perfectly willing to lay out the bare facts, for us to judge for ourselves. It's enough to win over those who are not fans of his music.

Directed by Richard Press, Bill Cunningham New York is a warm and charming portrait of the now octogenarian fashion photographer and cultural anthropologist, Bill Cunningham.

With only his trusty Schwinn bicycle for company, Cunningham has been documenting fashion in New York City for decades, practically inventing the concept of "street style" i.e. shooting 'ordinary', non-catwalk model folk as they go about their nattily dressed business. Cunningham himself is an eccentric living in a tiny one bedroom apartment which is filled with boxes and filing cabinets full of his photographs. The warmth and affection felt for him is made clear by the film's talking heads - an array of high fashion folk, including the famously reticent and icy editor of Vogue, Anna Wintour, who remarks "We all get dressed for Bill". So come along dressed for Bill, and The Rex of course. There's always a camera and/or photographer on

Bollocks tae 'at! Directed by Ken Loach, and written by Paul Laverty - the duo behind "The Wind That Shakes The Barley" and "Looking for Eric" - "The Angel's Share" is a darkly comic caper.

Our anti-hero Robbie (non-actor Paul Brannigan), a frustrated young offender, narrowly misses a custodial sentence for assault, and is instead sentenced to 300 hours community service under the watchful eye of the good natured Harry (John Henshaw). On a visit to a local distillery - along with other ne'er-do-wells Albert (Gary Maitland), Rhino (William Ruane) and Mo (newcomer Jasmin Riggins) - Harry notices Robbie has a rare nose for whisky; and Robbie and his pals spy a money-spinning opportunity to siphon off a rare, and hugely expensive malt to sell off to an unscrupulous buyer... "There is politics underlying every aspect of this funny, warm-hearted, deftly plotted film, and we fervently wish for the caper planned by this endearing quartet to succeed." The Observer (Simon Messenger, plucky Glaswegian and all). Ken Loach is still the only Brit-grit, screen storyteller who gets it right. Meadows, Arnold, Plan B etc, simply haven't listened. Don't miss.



Free Men Wed 11 7.30



After being caught by the Gestapo, young Algerian immigrant Younes (Rahim) is threatened with deportation unless he can infiltrate a Parisian mosque, blacklisted as a Resistance hotspot.

But he proves to be a lousy informant and is cut loose by the investigating Nazi officer, and inexplicably left to walk free? "Viewing the period from the perspective of North African immigrants in Paris is a fresh angle, but director Ismaël Ferroukhi fails to communicate much of the fear and paranoia of living in an occupied city." (Time Out)

There are gaps to be filled in secondworld-war history, and this is one: the role of North Africans in the French Resistance. Free Men takes the form of a semi-fictionalised thriller, headed by Tahar Rahim, who so impressed in A

He's more profiteer here: an immigrant wheeler-dealer in occupied Paris, forced by the Gestapo to spy on the city's mosque. Headed by a magnificently hangdog Michael Lonsdale, the mosque is suspected of issuing false papers identifying Jews as Muslims.

"The realities of war and his own ethnic identity induce a change of heart in him, though it's often difficult to remember there's a war on, the period is so sketchily evoked. The tension doesn't grip as it should, but it's a worthwhile reminder of a moment of Muslim-Jewish co-operation." (Guardian) Come for Tahar Rahim.

The summer of 1975 saw millions of people avoiding coastal areas, queuing around blocks and coining

'Blockbuster' Yes, the culprit for that sweet word? A thirty foot, three ton great white tin bath of a shark.

Now, four decades later, just when you thought it was safe to back to your seat, Spielberg's aquatic monstrosity turns up at The Rex in a terrifyingly pristine digital scrub.

Based on Peter Benchley's novel, Jaws' set-up couldn't be simpler; a local sheriff Brody (Scheider) a body washed up a peaceful Amity Island, a potential shark threat, a Chamber control mayor (Murray Hamilton), ignores his warnings, to keep the tourist beaches open for business. Cue screams, blood and shredded lilos. Brody gathers a motley crew of hombres; a marine biologist Hooper (Dreyfuss) and grizzled old shark hunter Quint (Shaw) to find the beast.

"Jaws is a perfect blend of set-pieces and story, its formula so hard to capture it's now near-mythical. Filmmakers have been chasing it ever since." (Total Film) Together with John Williams' now legendary score, Spielberg and co. took what should have been b-movie and turned it into a cinematic masterpiece. Its teeth marks are still felt to this day. (Jack Whiting) Best of all; Spielberg insisted on real sea locations, which accounted for some unforgettable boat improvisations, and Quint's unforgettable drunken dusk cabin song.

Snow White & The Huntsman Sat 14 7.00

We've been given two Snow White films in as many months and whilst Mirror Mirror happily indulged in its own silliness, and had Julia Roberts swanning around in goofy costumes; Hunstman on the other hand is an altogether darker, more Middle Earthy affair.

"Kristen Stewart plays Snow White, the daughter of a benevolent king who's bumped off by his maniacal man-hating wife, Ravenna (Charlize Theron), aka the Wicked Queen. Fleeing to the Dark Forest, Snow White makes the acquaintance of the Huntsman (Thor's Chris Hemsworth), a rough-diamond loner with a dark past and a terrible Glaswegian accent.

Pretty average so far. But then the dwarfs turn up, and the true horror begins. Wait, that's not Bob Hoskins is it? And it can't possibly be... Ray Winstone? But it is – and Toby Jones, Ian McShane, Nick Frost, and Eddie Marsan, too. The cream of British acting talent has been digitally shrunken and saddled with haircuts that make them look like a midget Slade tribute band." (*Time Out*)

The film's saving grace then, is Theron, her malevolent, bitter and deliciously bitchy queen is a welcome antidote to the gallant yet dull nature of our devil-may-care heroes. Fantasy is still enjoying its renaissance thanks to the success of the Rings trilogy, but Huntsman isn't going to usurp Peter Jackson any time soon. (*Jack Whiting*)



Two Days In New York Sun 15 6.00



Julie Delpy writes and directs in this cross-cultural farce; a sequel of sorts to 2007's biting comedy Two Days in Paris. Following the not so biting Before (& After) Sunrise: 2004.

Delpy reprises her role as Marion: a slightly unstable, intellectual late 30 something photographer. Having moved from Paris to New York, she's happily shacked up with DJ/writer Mingus (Chris Rock) both have children from previous relationships. The 'two days' refer to the hilarious, culture-clashing visit of Marion's family, her mad father (played by her real father, Albert), sister Rose (Alexia Landeau) and her irritating boyfriend Manu (Alexandre Nahon). Whilst it's fair to say the film derives a lot of its humour from poking fun at the French (and what's wrong with that?), Delpy's rapid-fire scripting, and Rock's naturally funny comic presence, make it worthwhile

Singing, actor and civil rights champion, Harry Belafonte became a key figure in the fight for equal rights for black Americans. Director Susanne Rostock's documentary tells his story. And a skilfully compiled celebratory biography of Harry Belafonte, it is. He was born into poverty in Harlem in 1927, raised in his father's native Jamaica, and after serving in the US navy at the end of the second world war, he worked as a janitor before being drawn into the theatre. From the late 1940s on he was primarily a singer, becoming sensationally successful in the 1950s as the 'King of Calypso'.

"There's so much more to Belafonte than the Banana Boat Song and Rostock does a fine job revealing it in a fitting celebration of a mighty talent." The delicate nature of his refugee status hangs in the balance... The story touches on themes of grief, loss, integration, unity, with the onus on the optimism of youth,

At the Oscars of 1960, The Apartment won Best Film with Billy Wilder taking Best Director.

Bud Baxter (Lemmon) is a struggling clerk in a huge New York insurance company. He is the archetypal put-upon and only tolerated for a place on the corporate ladder by lending out his apartment to executives for nooky. He often has to deal with the sordid aftermath of their visits but one night he's left with a bigger than usual nuisance on his hands. Enter Shirley Maclean's fabulous lift attendant Fran Kubelik. As a comedy, and an early major Hollywood production to play with sex and the abuse of power, The Apartment was years ahead of its time. (Isn't that what comedy does best?)




