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




Prive years... Sometimes feels like five minutes at others 50 years. Either way we're still here and on the whole, if not the best, it has been the latest best five years in all of our lives.



The Fantastic Mr Fox Tue 1 7.30



Back in December by huge demand. Based on Roald Dahl's seminal children's mischief, directed by perennial hipster Wes Anderson (The Darjeeling Limited), and co-written by Noah Baumbach, it tells the story of the Fox family's fight for survival.

After narrowly avoiding an ambush by the farmers from whom Mr. Fox (the fantastic Mr Clooney) steals his meals, he must find a way to get his family and friends out from the foxhole. Taking full responsibility, he happens upon the idea of digging under the farmhouses...

Voiced by an all star, if very American, cast including Meryl Streep, Bill Murray, Willem Dafoe and Adrian Brody, the film is terrific. Beautifully animated in painstaking stop-frame miniature animation, the piece is a joy to behold – Anderson reportedly spent some considerable time in Great Missenden ensuring that Dahl's Chiltern home village was strongly represented in the film. So watch out for familiar street corners

Released in this, the two hundredth anniversary year of Charles Darwin's birth, Jon Amiel's "Creation" is a masterful biopic of the life of the acclaimed naturalist.

Darwin (Paul Bettany) has returned from his (in)famous Beagle voyage, and is settling down to married life with his wife Emma (Bettany's real life wife, Jennifer Connolly), to work on his seminal "On The Origin Of The Species".

Devastated by a family tragedy and burdened by his growing disenchantment with his Christian faith, Bettany paints a sympathetic, yet realistic portrait of Darwin – a man torn between love for his devoutly religious wife, and his own scientific curiosity.

The Sixties are just beginning. The 'swinging' mid-decade hasn't begun, but there are hints Barber's schoolgirl alter ego, Jenny (CMulligan, actually 24, so its okay) falls for the glamourous older charmer, who offers her clubs, champagne, drives in the country and sex. This is not a gangster movie. It is one of the greatest stories of family ever told. Perhaps, the most complete story ever made into film. "Fredo, you're my brother and I love you, but never take sides against the family again" is the chilliest reminder, among even the warmest moments of dangerous filial affection. This is no ordinary family? On every level, it is a story exquisitely told in the tiniest detail. Apart from keeping up with names and faces, the audience is never left behind from the opening sequence through the evolution of truly believable characters, to the very bitter end.

It silhouettes that period of the twentieth century, just after the war and into the early 1950's when the Don tried to resist the new drugs trade but would be thwarted by progress and ambitious rivalry, soon to be enemies.

As Don Corleone, Brando is truly majestic in this role-of-all-roles to mark one of Hollywood's greatest comebacks. Curiously, Last Tango in Paris was made in the same year. As for Pacino, it was not only a star-making performance, he carries every unanticipated step of Michael's education into the 'family business' with such natural presence and extraordinary ease, we can see and feel every second of his reluctant coming-ofage. Then: the music... Perfect.



Welcome Mon 7 7.30



Philippe Loiret's film was shot in Calais, where young Kurd, Bilal (Firat Ayverdi) joins the dishevelled mass of bundled, shivering immigrants desperate to reach England. He is trying to reach his girlfriend in London, where she is about to be married off by her father. After being caught on a lorry, he vows to swim the Channel. So he starts his gruelling training at the local baths. The instructor (Lindon), himself already going through a painful divorce, begins to sympathise with the boy and endangers himself to help him. Loiret's painting of the Calais scene is devastatingly real. The two actors play with a quiet skill which emphasises each's predicament.

A friendship transcending age and cultural differences grows between them. The result is a sad tale which tries hard to tell the truth about a situation of which no one should be proud. However, a wonderfully affirming tale is drawn of adversity, redemption, and striving for goals that seem just out of reach. It is a small film not to be missed if only for the faces and the way they never waver into 'acting'. The French seem to do this better than most. So don't miss.

Hilary Swank stars in this biopic of legendary pilot Amelia Earhart, famed for being the first aviatrix to complete a solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean.

A series of vignettes chronicling Earhart's early life, her interest in aviation, her rocky marriage to publishing tycoon George Putnam (Richard Gere) and subsequent affair with Gene Vidal (Ewan McGregor) lead us to her fateful, perilous round-the-world flight attempt of 1937... Swank bears a startling resemblance to Earhart, and the production of the film visually impressive, but does it have any substance?

"...If you're the kind of person who deplores the modern vogue for debunking historical figures, and who welcomes the opportunity to indulge in heroic feats and lush landscapes similar to those found in Out Of Africa or The English Patient, then this is the film for you. Everyone else though will likely start nodding off during yet another sleepy performance from Richard Gere..." (Telegraph)

Bright Star

"Bright star, would I were steadfast as thou art..."

Jane Campion's latest, adapted from Andrew Motion's 1997 biography, chronicles the three year romance between poet John Keats (Ben Whishaw) and Fanny Brawne (Abbie Cornish). Initially girl-next-door seamstress Brawne is unimpressed with the waif-like Keats's work, and with literature in general, instead preferring to concentrate on her chosen art; but as the months go by, their relationship blossoms despite Keat's financial and physical failings; this impassioned, and ultimately tragic, romance inspired some of the greatest poetry of all time.

"It feels special without being at all precious. Eloquent, too, but not selfconsciously lyrical or florid... [Cornish isl terrific here at the centre and as the heartbeat of the film. She avoids both girlishness and the exaggerated mannerisms to which costume-drama performers often resort." (Telegraph) "[Campion's] film proceeds at a quiet, measured tempo and with a lucid calm. Another type of film would have supercharged its narrative moments with surging music and the engine-roar of dramatic acceleration, but Campion simply lets each scene unspool evenly... an ecstasy of loss." "The Men Who Stare At Goats" stars Ewan McGregor as Bob Wilson, a frustrated journalist covering the present Iraq conflict. He happens upon Lyn Cassady (George Clooney), who reveals he once formed part of a small, dedicated band of soldiers - "Jedi warriors" trained in para-psychological warfare, who honed their mental abilities on a quest for invisibility, intuition, and the ability to walk through walls. Kidnapped by a criminal gang, they're going to need all the help they can get; can Lyn deliver the goods?

"There's plenty to enjoy in the film's outré set-pieces, insouciant tone and playful performances... feels less like a transcendental breakthrough than a bit of conjuring misdirection. Fun trick, though," (Time Out)

White Christmas Wed 16 7.30



This stunning restoration from Park Circus is a reminder that amid the (false) gloom that digital is taking over projection boxes, there's a company restoring old film stock into brand new prints.

White Christmas is a treasure trove of Irving Berlin classics: 'Count Your Blessings', 'Sisters', 'Blue Skies', and the evergreen 'White Christmas'. Two song-and-dance men (Crosby and Kaye) team up after the war to become one of the hottest acts in show business. One winter, they join forces with a sister act (Gorgeous George's aunt, Rosemary Clooney... and the stunning Vera Ellen) and travel to Vermont for Christmas. The real 'adventure' starts when the 'boys' discover the run-down Inn belongs to their old army general. The result is the stuff of American dreams. Shmaltzy, and unashamedly sentimental, it is a perennial Christmas favourite with a longevity unlikely to fade. The 1950s was America's boom decade. It must have been a fabulous time to live there: Doris Day, the cars, the romance, the Technicolor, and Sinatra at his best... and every home (in the movies) had a fridge while we were still rationing carrots, finishing Sunday's hotpot on Tuesday and living in black, grev and scrubbed necks... but with some clear blue childhood skies.

It follows Harry Brown (Michael Caine) on a revenge trip through a chaotic world where drugs are the currency and the guns, knives and beatings run the streets.

A modest law-abiding citizen, He is a retired marine and a widower who lives alone on a depressed housing estate. His only company is his old mate Leonard (David Bradley). When Leonard is beaten to death. Harry is compelled to dispense his own brand of justice. As he bids to clean up the sink estate, he is noticed by the police, led by sickly sweet investigating officer DCI Frampton (Emily Mortimer).

"Ex-marine Caine blows the bloody hoodies away in what hopes to be 'Broken Britain's' answer to Gran Torino or worse Death Wish. Nasty" (Guardian Guide)

The Twilight Saga: New Moon Mon 28 7.30



In this sequel to the box-office phenomenon Twilight, also adapted from Stephanie Meyer's hit series of fantasy novels and this time helmed by the director of The Golden Compass the romance between mortal and vampire soars to new heights.

(Four overwhelming reasons in the first sentence to steer well clear) Following Bella's (Stewart) ill-fated 18th birthday party, Edward (Pattinson) leaves town in an effort to protect her from the dangers of his world

As the heartbroken Bella sleepwalks through her senior year at high school, she discovers Edward's image comes to her whenever she puts herself in danger. Her desire to be with him at any cost leads her to take greater and greater risks. New to the series is Dakota Fanning, who joins the cast as a waifish pixie type with an air of menace.

Bella sees action too, when she develops a taste for adrenaline in the hope of catching a glimpse of her plasma-sucking protector. Motorbike rides and deathly dives follow, along with a scenic race to Italy to meet an übervampire (and only highlight, Michael Sheen).

This is a soap opera for those old enough to see it and young enough to shriek at undead buff, topless young studs. Oh dear.

In 1982 legendary British heavy metal band Spinal Tap attempt an American comeback tour accompanied by a fan who is also a film-maker. The resulting documentary, interspersed with powerful performances of Tap's pivotal music and profound lyrics, candidly follows a rock group heading towards crisis, culminating in the infamous affair of the eighteeninch-high Stonehenge stage prop. "Reiner's brilliantly inventive script and smart visuals avoid all the obvious pitfalls, making this one of the funniest ever films about the music business. Most importantly of all, the musical numbers acutely mimic the crashing drums, thudding bass lines, whining lead guitar solos, and juvenile, sexist lyrics of heavy rock." (TimeOut)


