Road to Perdition

What do you do for an encore if you're director Sam Mendes? If ambition, screen craft and a cast to kill for were everything, Road to Perdition should have had every Oscar enthusiast trumpeting their way to the ceremony. Mendes is seemingly pretty good at this after all. Spielberg first contacted screenwriter David Self to adapt the story into a feature film but it ended up in the lap of Mendes. Here a mob enforcer's son witnesses a murder, forcing him and his father to take to the road and his father down a path of redemption and revenge. The actors deliver in multiples of exellence. Never once do we think we're watching a familiar Tom Hanks, whose almost sickly appearance aids him in the role of a solemn, guilt-ridden hit man. Family tragedy compels Hanks' Sullivan to seek revenge against his former associates while remaining one step ahead of the freelance assassin they've hired to kill him. America's most trusted man gets a much needed makeover.

Mendes seems to have a quality to draw from his performers. Or perhaps draw them to him. Anyone who has seen 1917 will testify to this. (*Research Chris Coetsee*) An outstanding edge-of-seat grip from start to finish. Be enthralled.

The Trial Of The Chicago 7

Aaron Sorkin's powerhouse drama puts the past on the stand to eerily reflect the politically turbulent world of the present. Set against the backdrop of the Vietnam War and the political tumult of the 1960s, this is a film thankfully free from typical 60s counterculture clichés. Chicago 7 instead artfully and urgently recreates the scene of the federal court hearing against a rag-tag band of political activists alleged to have conspired to incite the infamous riot at the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago. Cutting back and forth between the events of the convention and the subsequent show trial the following year, the raw and unflinching truth behind a shocking abandonment of law and justice is revealed. It's a story full of wonderful characters and performers. The history books provided Sorkin with an abundance of charismatic characters including Jerry Rubin (Jeremy Strong) and Abbie Hoffman (Sacha Baron Cohen) who really were larger-thanlife figures determined to make a mockery of the legal system. Aaron Sorkin has long demonstrated his ability to translate political theory into thrilling drama, but here he elevates his game to new heights. (Chris Coetsee)

The saviour of cinema is here! Well, not quite, but Christopher Nolan's mind bending, timey wimey thriller is certainly engineered for the big screen.

John David Washington is 'the Protagonist', a CIA agent recruited by a secret organisation to stop Russian baddie Sator (Keneth Brannagh) from detonating a bomb that will eradicate reality as we know it. So far, so James Bond. The twist is that, in order for Washington to thwart Sator's plans, he must alter the flow of time itself. Partnering with Robbert Pattinson's suave super-spy Neil (a less than suave name), they embark in some entropic espionage that will probably leave you utterly perplexed.

There's even a scene where someone tries to explain the film's concept on a literal whiteboard, but you won't get it, you won't get any of it, and maybe that's the point.

What with the cacophonous score pounding and pulsating over the important segments of dialogue, you won't care either; simply sit back and let the incredible set-pieces do their job. As one scientist neatly puts it, "Don't try to understand it. Feel it"; you can't help but think Nolan himself is trying to tell us something. (Jack Whiting)

Halla (Halldóra Geirharðsdóttir) is known to her friends as a quiet upbeat choir mistress. However, her seemingly unadventurous life covers up a dark secret. Halla is also 'The Mountain Woman'. The environmental activist waging a one-woman war on an international industrial giant to protect her bleak-glorious Icelandic rural landscape. The Grand Budapest Hotel

We're still waiting patiently for Wes Anderson's upcoming magnum opus: The French Dispatch, but let's jump back into his most elaborate, and accomplished work to date.

Set in a fictional European spa town between the world wars, The Grand Budapest Hotel pivots around the character of Monsieur Gustave H (Ralph Fiennes), the hotel concierge who believes that etiquette helps define civilization. Gustave's morals are no match for his manners as he enjoys sexual congress with guests of both sexes. It's a feast of a role, and Fiennes, exuding masterful verbal dexterity, nails every comic and dramatic nuance.

Anderson's frequently imitated, but never bettered, style is on full display; utilising all his tricks, and with an ensemble cast that'll make any filmmaker green with envy. It's a ornamental toy box of a film, so delicious-looking you may want to lick the screen. It is also, in the Anderson manner, shot through with humor, bittersweet heartbreak and a bruised romantic's view of the past. Eternal Beauty

Actor-turned-filmmaker Craig Roberts juggles quirky humour with hard truths in this darkly comical romantic drama.

After being dumped at the altar, Jane (Sally Hawkins) had a psychological breakdown. Two decades later, she is still unable to make emotional sense of her life, not helped at all by her self-absorbed family; pushy mum Vivian, browbeaten dad Dennis and cruel sister Nicola. At least older sister Alice makes a bit more of an effort, even if her husband sets Jane off. Tired of being heavily medicated by her doctor, Jane stops taking her pills and she soon finds herself connecting to fellow oddball Mike (David Thewlis). Anchoring a terrific cast, Hawkins gives a remarkably textured performance, continually revealing telling elements of Jane's personality. She may seem hopelessly batty, but she's easily the most likeable person in her family, a woman broken by a trauma and finally finding healing on her own terms. Thewlis is charming as the equally offbeat Mike, effortlessly making Jane smile. Films about depression and mental instability are notoriously tricky to pull off. Here Roberts' ambitious balancing act of bleak drama and genuine laughs is an authentic, surprising and rewarding watch. (Chris Coetsee)

The Ladykillers

One of the last Ealing comedies of the 1950s, Alexander Mackendrick's deliciously dark crime caper celebrates its 65th birthday.

Mrs. Wilberforce, an old lady living alone in a tumbledown house near King's Cross, decides to take in a lodger. The eccentric Professor Marcus soon arrives and is frequently visited by four sinister friends. Under the pretence of amateur musicians, the group are in fact planning a daring robbery in which Mrs. Wilberforce and her home are to be unwittingly involved. When the stolen money is discovered, the gang are faced with only one option; the old girl's got to go. But as the bumbling crooks wind up double-crossing each other, their numbers slowly reduce one by one.

Alec Guinness delivers a typically mesmerising performance as Professor Marcus alongside the likes of Peter Sellers, Cecil Parker and the superb Katie Johnson.

Wickedly hilarious and a precise balance of situational comedy and stark murderous callousness, it's a treat. If you've seen it before, make sure you see it again on the big screen. And if you've never seen it before, you owe it to yourself to see one of the British film industry's true greats. (Chris Coetsee)

Bassam Tariq's emotionally resonant drama about a young man facing a momentous challenge.

British-Pakistani rapper Zed is finally getting his big break. Before going on tour he heads to London to see his parents and reconnect with his culture, repeatedly facing up to criticism. When he's diagnosed with an auto-immune disease, the illness and its experimental treatment threaten to derail his big chance.

An exploration of identity and legacy, the film has a hallucinatory style that plays on internalised feelings rather than plot details. The title is telling of Zed's struggle between capitalism and identity. Culture and religion also swirl throughout the story, never overly explored but adding texture to characters and relationships.

Riz Ahmed bursts from the screen as the impassioned rapper, and is just as magnetic in Zed's more thoughtful moments. He's so easy to identify with that we feel each step in this journey with him, including his anger, frustration and fear. It's a beautiful, harrowingly raw performance. As his strict father, Khan creates intense moments in clashes that bring out both common ground and bitter differences. Vigorous and stylish, it is a fascinating, intimate 90 minutes of filmmaking. Aliens

The one that started it all. This is how you debut a beloved book series on film, and Connery hits the ground running as the suave secret agent.

Looking back on Dr. No after 24 films, it appears modest in comparison, with 007 doing his job without the assistance of elaborate ordnance or eyepopping gadgetry. Yet so much of the Bond mythos is already in place the second Dr. No begins: the gunbarrel; the "Bond, James Bond" introduction (this being the perfect iteration - white dinner jacket, cigarette loosely on the lip); the secret lair; and of course, the girls, of which Ursula Andress still holds the crown.

Dr. No himself, an evil genius with metal hands, is about as ludicrous and clichéd as his elaborate stronghold, but there's a quiet intensity to him that

is rarely seen in other Bond villains.

Since then there have been bigger Bond moments. More dramatic Bond moments. Funnier Bond moments. Tenser Bond moments. But 60 years on, there is still no cooler Bond moment than his introduction – and there never will be. (Jack Whiting)

Classical Hollywood studio filmmaking meets scrappy, British indie auteur - Ben Wheatly isn't an obvious choice to take on Daphne du Maurier's gothic romance. Yet for those who aren't into his brand of weird, I'm happy to report that this update is a straightforward affair. Perhaps unsurprisingly so; it's one of those novels where any changes could be considered treason. The setting is Monte Carlo; desperate to escape the clutches of her odious employer, Lily James jumps at the chance to accompany the handsome Maxim DeWinter (Armie Hammer) on several daytime activities. Over a week or two, the pair fall for each other. Even the revelation that DeWinter's wife, the mysterious Rebecca, recently passed away in suspicious circumstances doesn't stop James' naive protagonist from snapping his hand when he proposes. So back to Manderley they go, and it's at this Cornwall estate where the wheels start to come off. Kristin Scott Thomas' delicious performance as the vicious housekeeper Mrs Danvers, is the one element of the modern Rebecca that surpasses Hitchcock's take. Personally, I would have preferred a little more Wheatley bite, but this handsome adaptation is nevertheless sumptuous and sweeping. (Jack Whiting)

The Lives Of Others

A remarkably assured first feature from von Donnersmarck and the film's true star: Ulrich Mühe who died only a year after the film's release. I hope

he got to see his remarkable, compelling portrayal. It paints a dark picture of life under the dying Cold-War Communist regime in the German Democratic Republic (GDR). A grey world inhabited by these extraordinary faces is set mainly in East Berlin during the mid 1980s. It chronicles the Minister of Culture's decision to investigate the lives of a successful playwright and his actress wife. He is, of course that senior Official fat gargoyle, who happens to fancy-slobbering over her.

His power gets his way (never heard of such a thing). Questioning his own ethics, the Stasi officer in charge of prying, becomes profoundly affected by bugging this 'innocent' couple. This film succeeds both as a convincing historical recreation and a compelling tale of individuals trapped in the dying years of evil institutional mistrust. (uh oh...?) A perfect cast of imperfect faces. Upon release, the film caused an extraordinary stir in the old Eastern Bloc. Here is a glance at today's curious parallel: the newly-masked, fearful 'greater-good' pushing willingly into our own fear bubble. Come see for yourself... but tell no one.

The Untouchables

There are many, many things to adore about The Untouchables, Brian De Palma's most satisfying of his films.

Few old TV shows have been brought to the big screen with such brio as De Palma's majestic adaptation of the 60s small screen classic (he did it again with Mission: Impossible, no less)
Set in Chicago during Prohibition, The Untouchables revolves around Eliot Ness (Kevin Costner), a rookie G-man who assembles a rough-and-ready team of unbribable agents to smash Capone's (Robert De Niro) empire. Under the instruction of veteran Irish cop Jimmy Malone (Sean Connery, career best), Ness is forced to become as ruthless as his quarry, resulting in a series of thrilling action set-pieces and some brilliant banter courtesy of screenwriter David Mamet.

In this age of sprawling, messy comic book adaptations, The Untouchables got it right without even being a graphic novel to begin with. The design is clean, bright and framed by the strict lines of the Chicago streets. The sensibility is outlandish, almost fantasy. 

A Christmas Carol

Welcome to our 16th anniversary Christmas, with the same old irresistible film that opened our first Christmas and has been faithfully seeing it in ever since. (December 2004)

The simplest universal message: without that kind-one in your life, our world is

Happy Christmas. Have fun, go easy and raise a glass to a world where a George Bailey might re-emerge for our future's children.



White Christmas

The BFI's meticulously restored White Christmas is a treasure trove of Irving Berlin classics: 'Sisters', 'Blue Skies', and of course...

Two song-and-dance men (Crosby and Kaye, actually only one, Bing can't dance) team up after the war to become one of the hottest acts in show-biz. One winter, after joining forces with a sister act (Gorgeous George's aunt, Rosemary Clooney and stunning Vera Ellen) they hit the road. The real 'adventure' starts at a gig in Vermont. The run-down Inn belongs to their old army General. The result is unabashed sentimental slush, an immortal, perennial Christmas favourite unlikely to fade. 1950s: America's boom decade. Was it a fabulous time there? Bogart, Brando and Doris Day; the cars, the romance, the Technicolor, with Ella and Sinatra in their prime. At the Pictures every home had a piano and a fridge while we were still rationing carrots and living in forty shades of grey (without a trace of smut) enjoying scrubbed necks, goose grease, darned socks, nits and the unforgiving one-pair of shoes worn too long for growing toes. But somehow Christmas always brought the annuals: Beano and Dandy and that single precious Mars bar. No television! There-there now... 'The Past is another Country'. White Christmas remains a borderless fantasy passport.

The Grinch

Benedict Cumberbatch is the last person I'd expect to voice this classic character, but he does an impressive job embodying the surly, sour, but ultimately wounded soul.

The Grinch lives on a mountain high above the town of Whovillle, where festive goodwill is spreading like an epidemic. Like Scrooge, there's an explanation for his shrivelled heart that's rooted in the Grinch's backstory: he grew up unloved in an orphanage where Christmas came not even once a year. To destroy the fun for everyone else, the Grinch is impersonating Santa to steal the town's presents. At the same time, cute-as-a-button poppet Cindy Lou cracks a plan to trap Santa as he comes down the chimney to be doubly sure her Christmas wishes come true.

While this is a much safer iteration of the Dr. Zeus creation; far more so than the admittedly terrifying, Jim Carrey horror show from nearly two decades ago, and though its ambition remains rather low, the visual gags and charm will warm over any cold critic. The Secret Garden

Wild Tales

Wild Tales, put simply, is an ingenious collection of nightmarish stories. Damián Szifron's dark mind is on full display in a black-comedy masterclass quite unlike anything we've seen before.

A satire of survival in a corrupt and cynical Argentina, each of the short accounts on display here chronicle all walks of life; a parking fine, a furious bride, a bout of in-flight paranoia. This is just a teaser in what to expect from a rabbit-hole of confusion and violent hilarity.

Frantic from the off, the pre-credits short sets the bench-mark so high, it takes an entire film to match it. The visuals are stunning, a real pleasure, and the bizarre soundtrack screams with you.

e saw his first 007 outing in Dr No in Sept/October? 1962, the same months we caught the Beatles for the first time at lunchtime sessions at the Cavern. Some Autumn - that was.

Who could know, both icons would come with us for the rest of our lives, and two of them (and one of us) would have used theirs up already. George went 19 years ago on 21st Nov 2001, John, 21 years before.

Now it's Sean's turn, and Goldfinger finally gets his wish. Connery's James Bond was as instant a revolution as were the Beatles. An extraordinay and spontaneous coming-of-age. We love a villain, often more than the hero. In Sean's Bond he was never shaken. So his following was assured and has never evaporated. Zardos aside, he managed to avoid turkeys, though I wouldn't rush to watch all his diverse catalogue. But as much as he grew to shrug off the label, he made Bond entirely his own, both compelling and ridiculous (that little towelling'number'?). He could light a cigarette as coolly as dispatching baddies and kissing all the girls. Which is why every actor who followed him, has followed him. What else could they do. Roger exaggerated the mischief. Daniel self consciously swaggers and pouts, and Pierce played it straight - but they all followed. For sheer style, he left them standing with nothing better to do than practice "the name's Bond - James Bond" and miss. In spite of the things 'they'

will find to drag up about him, he steered clear of the limelight, was rarely interviewed and like a true hero villain, went off to play golf between gigs. I hope he hated being 90. Our glasses are for ever raised to you Mr Bond.

t all began one sunny weekday at the end of the millennium summer of 2000 in the garden of the Old Swan at Swan Bottom.


We met to discuss further, this crazy idea of rescuing the old derelict Rex in Berkhamsted. To start the ball rolling, at the end of our sober drinks and without ceremony or fuss, he handed me a cheque for £5000 'seedcorn'. It was 'the beginning of a beautiful partnership' based on loans, without interference. He left me to it from that day on. And the seedcorn was free, a gesture which I will never forget.

We had met years before at the many Chiltern country gigs during the summers of 1987/8/&9 at the Buckinghamshire hamlets of Ballinger and The Lee. We would run into each other on Sunday afternoon 'lock-ins' at the Old Swan, and became great friends amongst an entertaining bunch of well-heeled mid-40s County reprobates.

Jumping ahead to keep it short, Paul remains at the top of a very short list of most beloved and trusted friends alongside Alan Clooney, and later Ed Mauger, (the genius pairing who handbuilt the whole cine infrastructure into the Rex you see today and still alive last time I looked). Where you are walking, sitting, raising glasses in wide open comfort; watching & listening to immaculate sound and vision, is all down to these three, together with the other fantastic handful of trusted artisans and grafters.

o with Paul's never-ending cash flow and their expertise we finally opened in December 2004 without need for pro-builders, nor a penny wasted on experts or 'consultants'. We have remained close ever since, he welcoming me into the heart of his loving family. He never talked of the money (repaid as the Rex grew in success).

Clearly, he is already much missed, and this years 16th anniversary will be the first time his chair will be empty.



The whole fanciful tale is coming, albeit slowly. Each chapter is named after the principal characters, thus tying the whole yarn together.

Even while still scribbled in pencil, it is dedicated to Paul. Now I wish I'd kept them sharp while he was still here to read it. So this inadequate flake of his life will have to do as my seedcorn to him.
