#### THE ADVANCED BOOKING LIST (ABL): IMPORTANT...

This expires 30th November. The current ABL year will end with November's film listing. Please note:

it does not extend into December. The new one begins on 1st December. Renewal will not be automatic, so the ABL will not roll-over into the new year (Dec'08 to Nov'09). Instead the ABL will go on sale for everybody on **Saturday 25th October** at 10.30 am from the box office. This way, it is hoped everybody has the same chance.

The ABL is limited to 500 people and will cost £175. This year's experimental limit of 500 has successfully ensured, that upon general release, more people than before were able to get tickers for the most popular films.

I hope you agree this has made it easier for everyone to get tickets compared to the early rushes of the first two years.

One title (the indestructible Mamma Mia) sold out on general release weekend.

No other title all year has done this, unlike in 2007 when things were selling out even before general release!

We don't expect this new ABL to sell out on the first weekend (25th Oct) so please take time to consider it. Remember too we hold back a limited number of seats for the nightly raffle on the door. # Everything is Illuminated Wed 1 7 30

In February our introduction read: "Everyone must see this..." In October it remains the same. It didn't sell out (140 or so) on its first outing in February 2006. I hope that first audience feels as lucky and privileged as I did and do. Consequently, its many repeat screenings have sold out. Taken from Jonathan Safran Foer bestseller, it reads like a true story. 'Jonfen' (Elijah) is an obsessive collector, who journeys from America in search of the woman he believes saved his grandfather during the Nazi massacre of a lost Ukrainian village. With only a creased b&w photograph he sets off with the unlikely Eugene, his grandfather (the brilliant Leskin) and his "seeing-eye" bitch. Eugene's passion for the American myth and his butchery of spoken English will win your heart with every word and gesture.

Come for Eugene Hutz's perplexed Ukranian 'guide' and his beautifully judged narration. (much of the glorious filmscore is his too; watch out for his real band playing at the station). Schreiber's direction is unhurried and priceless. An unexpected surprise from an actor. He clearly understands, real genius means keeping out of the way.

It is haunting, heartlifting, heartbreaking, surprising and funny all at once - and one of the best films in our first four years. It will stay with you.



#### Brighton Rock Thu 2 7.30



This early classic from Graham Greene put Richard Attenborough on a career path spanning more than 60 years and most importantly, introduced us to Jack Warner aka Dixon Of Dock Green.

Pinkie Brown (Attenborough) is a small-town hoodlum whose gang runs a protection racket based at Brighton racecourse. When he orders the murder of a rival, Fred (Alan Wheatley), the police close it as suicide. This doesn't convince Ida Arnold (Hermione Baddeley), who was with Fred just before he died, and she sets out to find the truth.

This seems a simple tale from Greene with none of the political subterfuge or international intrigue of his future novels, but look closer...

It's an honour to be part of Berkhamsted's Graham Greene festival for a third year. Not to missed, especially by those who nothing of Greene and even less about early post war film making.

## **Get Smart**

Based on the 1960s spy parody series created by comic legends Mel Brooks and Buck Henry, Get Smart is just the thing for October. (You'll notice a few comedies in this month's programme) The reliable and ever watchable Steve Carell (40-Year Old Virgin, Anchorman, Little Miss Sunshine) stars as Maxwell Smart, a pre-eminent analyst at a top secret intelligence agency. When his agency is attacked by a ruthless terrorist group (led by Terence Stamp), it's up to the clumsy Smart and his partner, the beautifully efficient Agent 99 (Anne Hathaway) to uncover and eradicate the nuclear threat before it's too late Unusual for a screwball comedy, there are some spectacular action sequences and an oddly high profile supporting cast in Alan Arkin, Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson and Bill Murray. Get Smart is a light-hearted if light-weight addition to an already crowded, escapist spy spoofs - Johnny English anyone?

"If you like Carell's faintly anxious, fussy shtick then this silly, good-humoured film will prove more than tolerable...even when Get Smart loses its way, it remains an amiable journey." (Telegraph) Whater it is, it is a relief from this "serious" James Bond business. You'll love it ...?

## Three Colours: Blue Sun 5 6.00



Unafraid of tackling vast themes, Kieslowski is perhaps best known for "The Dekalog", a ten part mini-series based on the themes of the Ten Commandments. Stanley Kubrick once described it as the only masterpiece he could name in his lifetime. So too for his brilliant Three Colours Trilogy – a beautifully emotive exploration of the French revolutionary ideals of liberty (blue), equality (white) and fraternity (red).

In Three Colours: Blue, the first of the non-sequential trilogy, Juliette Binoche (in her most powerful role) plays Julie, the grieving wife of recently deceased composer Patrice. Her desire for a life of quiet freedom and anonymity in Paris is upset as she is forced to confront unfinished issues surrounding her husband's life, his work and his relationships...

Featuring exceptional cinematography, and haunting score by Zbigniew Preisner, Blue is a feast; visually and aurally. Highly praised upon its release in 1993, it is atmospheric, compelling and brilliantly executed. A lesson in the power of cinema and a master class in screenplay, lighting and direction.

# Somers Town

### plus short film

This is another grittily poetic coming-ofage tale, set in a depressed location. It is the latest film from Meadows

depicting the transition from childhood to grown-up - in no time.

Teen urchin Tomo (Turgoose) flees his Nottingham care home and winds up in Somers Town the grim, gang-ridden ghetto between Euston and St Pancras.

Marek (Jagiello), a Polish immigrant, lives with his father, who drinks after a long day's work on the new Eurostar terminal (The film was largely sponsored by Eurostar). The quiet and sensitive Marek is not comfortable in his father's world. Separately at first then together, the boys struggle to make sense of their new environment. A chance meeting in Somers Town, leads them to form an unlikely friendship. The new friends attempt to win the heart of Maria (Lasowski), a French girl waitressing to pay her way home. The film's frequently uncompromising portrait of the realities of life for those on the margins of society is leavened by Meadows' characteristic humour and sympathy for his characters. It is worth it on many levels not least the closing scene... and the Terry Henry Arsenal shirt. Come, see if its must-see hype is dressed in 'new clothes'.

This new print of the sexy 1970s
Bertolucci classic thriller should not be missed. Interestingly, director Bernardo saw a parallel between his own life and that of the main character, which it is said, lent the film added relevance and potency, but don't let that put you off. Autobiography should be banned from story-telling.

If an ego is too big to tell a story where the central character is not 'you', then best shut up and leave it to a storyteller. That said, the film's visual style is legendary due in no small part to the immaculate cinematography of Vittorio Storaro.

The story opens in 1938 Rome, where Marcello has just taken a job working for Mussollini and is courting a beautiful young woman who will make him even more of a conformist. Marcello is going to Paris on his honeymoon and his bosses have an assignment for him there... "In an enchanted forest in the time of the Druids, the shepherd Céladon and the shepherdess Astrée share a pure and chaste love. Fooled by a suitor, Astrée dismisses Céladon. In despair he throws himself into the rushing river. She thinks he's dead, but he is secratly rescued by a bevy of nymphs. Faithful to his promise to Astrée to never appear before her again, Céladon must overcome many obstacles to break the curse. Thus a quest. Mad with love and despair. coveted by the nymphs, surrounded by rivals, and obliged to disguise himself as a woman to be near the one he loves, will he manage to make himself known without breaking his oath? A romance filled with doubt, hazards, and delicious temptations." (taken from a website, so possibly written by a grown man in tight suede shorts)

At 88, Eric Rohmer says this is his last film, so worth seeing for that. Critics are polarised between wonder and ridicule. It sounds a bit camp, but fairy tales are. They're also fantastic to fall into, like being read to as a child.



#### Blindsight **Tue 14** 7.30



This inspirational documentary by Lucy Walker follows the attempt by the blind American mountain climber Erik Weihenmayer to lead an expedition of six blind Tibetan children up the north face of Everest. The crux of Blindsight is not whether they reach the top but a million other things. The kids are outcasts in their own country, where it is believed their affliction is a punishment for former sins. They are said to be possessed by demons, thus rejected by their families and society.

"The film-making is straightforward in comparison with something such as Man On Wire. The story becomes a fascinating exploration into the nature of being blind and the trust it engenders in those who can see. Weihenmayer is determined to conquer the peak. The children, on the other hand, prefer to savour each new sensation along the way." (Times' Knowledge)

"You wouldn't believe it as fiction. It is easy to see awards beckoning. Walker never puts herself in front of her extraordinary subjects." (Standard) Yeah? So what happens to the kids when they go home? Somebody asked "why not teach them the piano instead?" Inferring they have enough pain. It sounds a bit heartbreaking to me.

Set in Edwardian England from 1905 onwards, ANGEL traces the career of would-be novelist Angel Deverell (Garai), whose blithe innocence of the ways of the world doesn't stop her pen from spilling forth torrid romantic fantasies.

Angel's literary career is a runaway success, and the headstrong ingénue becomes the Barbara Cartland of her time. Wealth, fame and love come her way, but the one thing that continues to evade her is wisdom.

Garai is spirited, affecting and finally troubling in a role that might have honoured Bette Davis in her youthful heyday. "An unexpected change of direction from Ozon (remember Eight Women?), this is a brave and bracing rags-to-riches melodrama."

Not sure about brave but a melodrama it certainly is and Romola plays her heart out.

Fabulous to look at, it has a beginning, middle and end. Come for this.

#### Anchorman Thu 18 7.30



This has been on the request list since we reopened four years ago. Finally it is here to cheer October and compete for 'feelgood' (and smiles as you leave) with the indestructible Mamma Mia! It's the 1970's, San Diego news anchorman Ron Burgundy is top dog in network TV. His freewheeling sexism and obvious gags with his crew are legendary. But all this is about to change when ambitious reporter Veronica Corningstone has just arrived as a new employee at his TV station.

Will Ferrell is Ron Burgundy. When feminism marches into the newsroom in the shape of ambitious newswoman Veronica Corningstone (Applegate), Ron is willing to play along at first as long as Veronica stays in her place, covering cat fashion shows, cooking, and other "female" interests. But when Veronica refuses to settle for being eye candy and steps behind the news desk, it's more than a battle between two perfectly coiffered anchor-persons... it's war. Come for the ridiculous antics, the lightning banter and the full catalogue of Will Ferrell's very silly faces. "Turn off your mind, relax and float downstream..." (Not quite what Lennon had in mind but it fits)

## The Duchess

Knightley in the titular role as the
brilliant and beautiful 18th century
pseudo-royal whose life was tragically cut
short in a Parisian underpass in 1997!
Thankfully director Saul Dibb's marketing
campaign hasn't quite gone that far in
stretching the parallels between Georgiana,
and her great-great-great-great niece,
Diana. No its merely milking it dry.
Fortunately, the film itself, seems to be
okay

Georgiana (Knightley) is an intelligent, fashionable aristocrat trapped in a loveless, contractual marriage to William Cavendish, Duke of Devonshire (Ralph Fiennes). The film details Georgiana's complex ménage a trois with William and her best friend, Lady Bess Foster (Hayley Atwell). Knightley's star quality actually works in her favour as she inhabits Georgiana's character. Ralph is good as the dour and boorish, Charles-like Duke who delivers the film's best line in response to a towering wig inferno.

It's not perfect — "the film bends over backwards to be sympathetic to her, to the point that it can barely acknowledge her flaws..." (Siobhan Synnot) but with a starry cast, big costumes and hair, and more stately homes than in the National Trust Yearbook, it looks fantastic. Come for that.

#### **Badlands** Wed 22 7 30

From the opening shot with white tshirted Sheen riding on a dust cart in Terrance Malik's 1973 directorial debut. you know you're in for a rough ride.

Quite how rough, still comes as a shock. Loosely based on the true events of the 1950s Starkweather-Fugate murders, Badlands follows socio/psychopathic James Dean-wannabe Kit (Sheen) and his listless 15 year old girlfriend Holly (Spacek) as they embark on an apparently random cross-country killing spree. Set in rural post-war South Dakota, Malik brilliantly juxtaposes the idyll of the American Deep South with its ominous, ever-present threat of violence.

The characters too mirror these conflicting world-views - "...Holly's voiceover (in the style of the celebrity-obsessed magazines she's forever reading) is tellingly balanced both by the fugitive couple's actions and by Kit's oddly moralistic pronouncements..." (BFI) They say Malik is light-years (decades at least) ahead of films like Natural Born Killers and No Country For Old Men with his sophisticated critique of America's cultural values, its easy violence and maudlin family ties.

Featuring some wonderful cinematography (the land may be bad but as is often the way, it looks fantastic) James Taylor cropping up on the soundtrack, completes it. It fell at the US box office, which might explain its longevity.

#### Partition Sun 26 6.00



A fantastic and spectacular story of the war years leading up to 1947 and the dividing of India into three separate states by the departing British Raj. Muslims living in India were given East and West Pakistan and Hindus, Sikh and Christians were driven across the new borders into India. This was Partition. After 300 years of British colonial rule they separated the fighting tribes by giving them their own boundaries in their own countries. The cross-over was bloody and the consequences echo to this day. "Determined to leave the ravages of war behind, 38 year old Gian Singh (Jimi Mistry) resigns from the British Indian Army to come home. It is not the home he left. By chance he finds himself responsible for the life of Naseem a 17 year muslim old girl, traumatized by being separated from her family. Slowly but inevitably, resisting all the taboos, Gian and Naseem fall in love. 



#### Badlands Wed 22 2 00



From the opening shot with white tshirted Sheen riding on a dust cart in Terrance Malik's 1973 directorial debut, vou know vou're in for a rough ride. Quite how rough, still comes as a shock. Loosely based on the true events of the 1950s Starkweather-Fugate murders, Badlands follows socio/psychopathic James Dean-wannabe Kit (Sheen) and his listless 15 year old girlfriend Holly (Spacek) as they embark on an apparently random cross-country killing spree. Set in rural post-war South Dakota, Malik brilliantly juxtaposes the idyll of the American Deep South with its ominous, ever-present threat of violence. The characters too mirror these conflicting world-views - "...Holly's voiceover (in the

world-views — ...Holly's Voiceover (in the style of the celebrity-obsessed magazines she's forever reading) is tellingly balanced both by the fugitive couple's actions and by Kit's oddly moralistic pronouncements..." (BFI) They say Malik is light-years (decades at least) ahead of films like Natural Born Killers and No Country For Old Men with his sophisticated critique of America's cultural values, its easy violence and maudlin family ties.

Featuring some wonderful cinematography (the land may be bad but as is often the way, it looks fantastic) James Taylor cropping up on the soundtrack, completes it. It fell at the US box office, which might explain its longevity.

Marc Anthony stars as the 'King of Salsa' in this musical biopic produced by his wife and co-star Jennifer Lopez.

El Cantante is an upfront, matter-of-fact and entirely superficial portrait of Hector Lavoe, a Puerto Rican crooner who brought a new Latin beat to the streets of New York in the 1970s. Meanwhile, backstage, he was descending into that same old spiral of self-destruction that killed many a musician before him and which makes this story as predictable as the lyrics to 'Happy Birthday'.

The recreation of his concerts - with Anthony providing the vocals - is cheerful and definitely worth a listen, but while we're assured that this music was important and innovative, we're not told what made it so.

"The focus is on Lavoe's clichéd slide into addiction and his soap-opera relationship with his wife, charmlessly played by Lopez herself." (Sunday Times) For Salsa fans on an October afternoon it is music jammed-full and showing nowhere else. Come for that
